## Civil Rights Urged

NEW YORK (CPS) The Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC), in a letter to U Thant, has urged the United Nations Commission to demand that the United States "act immediately to guarantee the safety and dignity of all American citizens and that the commission investigate violations of civil rights and the rampant racism existing in this country."

Included in the letter was a description of the church bombing in Birmingham, and charges that large portions of the citizenry are denied the right to vote, as well as being subject to police brutality. The SNCC also charged that there is racial discrimination in housing, employment, education, and public accommodations.

Undergraduate coeds 21 or over at the State University of Iowa will have "privileged hours" beginning next term. Although their exact closing hours have not yet been decided, the girls need not return to their dorms before midnight during the week and before 1 a.m. on Saturdays and Sundays.

Campus police at the University of California at Santa Barbara received a report on Oct. 10 that a rattlesnake was being kept inside a box in one of the dorms. Officers went to the suspect's room, calmly removed the snake to the Reptile House in the physical science building and notified the snake's owner of its evacuation.

## Student Vacation Change Examined

(ACP) The typical undergraduate of the future may not be able to take his vacation in the summer, notes the Michigan State News.

Merrill R. Pierson, assistant MSU treasurer, said it is true that many students need a term's vacation to make money to finance their education.

"However," he noted, "this would not really account for the fact that undergraduate summer enrollment has not increased vastly. Students are finding it increasingly difficult to obtain summer jobs. The chances might be better during other terms."

"It would seem the reason might rest with traditional attitudes toward summer vacation, the fact that students aren't used to the idea of taking their vacations at any other time."

John A. Fuzak, dean of students at MSU, said: "There aren't enough teachers to go around. You can't start new colleges and universities without the teachers, and there is one reason I believe full year-round use of our facilities will eventually become a reality. There are a variety of student activities during the regular academic year which we don't have during the summer. Of course, this would undoubtedly change if there were a more equal distribution of students throughout the year."
