## WSU Hot-Cold Team

The Oregon football team, turning in recent weeks to tricks of lameness and injuries, travels to Pullman this weekend to play a not-too-impressive Washington State team.

While the Ducks were losing to San Jose State last Saturday, WSU was upsetting a tough Idaho squad. The Cougars were helped by Bill Gaskins, a track hurdler, who made his way for a 92-yard touchdown.

The Cougars have been quite unpredictable heretofore in their first seven games.

In their initial outing, Texas Tech, a team that won only one game in 1962, came on strong and, with the aid of three field goals, upset WSU, 16-7.

## Tie Big Ten Iowa

However, the following Saturday saw the Cougars bare their fangs at Big Ten Conference foe, Iowa, and battle the Hawkeyes to a 14-14 tie. The game was marked by a controversial play, when, with only a few seconds remaining on the clock, Iowa was given possession of the ball when it was actually fourth down for the Cougars.

Halfback Clarence Williams came of age in this contest, running for one 23-yard touchdown, and gaining substantial yardage in an 80-yard drive that led to another tally. In all, Williams gained 130 yards on 21 carries.

## Spartans Defeat Both Teams

The following week Williams ran for 148 yards on 18 carries, including a 75-yard touchdown,

in a 7-2 WSU victory over Arizona.

The next Cougar opponent was the San Jose State Spartans. The Spartans managed to contain Williams, then ranked second nationally in rushing yardage, and held WSU to 64 yards on the ground while beating them, 13-8.

The Oregon State Beavers provided WSU's next competition and proved too tough for the Cougars to handle. After the Cougars' brief glory of an 80-yard scoring drive, the Beavers scored 30 consecutive points to grind out the Cougar victory hopes.

Washington State Coach Jim Sutherland admitted they were beaten physically as well as scorewise. This may explain the subsequent defeat at the hands of Army, and the Cougars' minus

three yards net rushing for the day.

Following the 23-0 loss to Army, the Cougars beat Idaho, 14-10, in somewhat of an upset.

Unless the injury-riddled Oregon offense is quickly healed the Cougars just might have enough manpower to hand the Ducks another humiliating upset.

## Cas Finds It Hard To Explain Upset

"It was just one of those days you can't explain," said Oregon Head Coach Len Casanova.

The day was Saturday, November 2, and what the Webfoot head mentor couldn't explain was the Duck's upset loss to San Jose State, 13-7.

"Nothing went right," continued Cas, "we made some mistakes we just can't account for."

"I found it pretty hard to find anything to say to them at half time, here was a team that had gained only 10 yards in the first half, and did not have a single first down, yet had 13 points on the score board. I couldn't really say our defense was bad," Cas said.

Speaking of Jack Sovereign's inability to move the Webfoots through the air, Cas said, "I think he did a pretty fair job. You can't blame a quarterback when somebody misses a block."

He was referring to the pass interception which went for 75 yards and San Jose's second touchdown.

"Jack was a little bit cautious about his throwing," Cas added, "but I don't think he can be criticized."

The hero of the game was certainly Lu Bain. He turned in an outstanding performance at fullback and stepped in at the quarterback slot to direct the Webfoot attack.

"Overall," Cas said, "Lu did a real outstanding job both offensively and defensively."

Cas also praised the efforts of sophomore halfback Dennis Keller and reserve tackle Lowell Dean.

Injury wise, Cas had anything but good news for the Webfoots.

"Larry Hill will be out for two weeks and possibly the rest of the season," Cas said.

"The ironic thing about Hill's injury," Cas added, "was that just before the game I handed him his invitation to play in the Hula Bowl."

Referring briefly to the game again, Cas said, "We sure gave them a real impetus to win when we gave them 13 points in the first quarter."
