

Ski School Will Open in January

A Ski School is being planned for this winter under the co-sponsorship of the Student Union Board and the Oregon Daily Emerald. It will be held on weekdays, beginning in January, in the Willamette Ski Area.

Jack Cross, head of the School, reported that "only eight students had signed up for the ski instruction to date."

"More students are expected to sign up," said Cross, adding, "There will be many who will not be able to get into the class offered by the P.E. Department next term."

Two four-week sessions are planned, at a cost of \$20 each.

OSU Kappa Sigs Held for Jury

CORVALLIS (UPI) — Three Oregon State University fraternity men have been bound over to the Benton County Grand Jury on charges of taking a valuable silver service and other items from a sorority.

Two of the five arrested Nov. 10 have been freed of charges.

The three members of Kappa Sigma were bound to the grand jury by District Judge Robert Gilliland following a preliminary hearing Monday afternoon. They are Douglas A. Wilson and Robert L. Caulfield, both 18 and both of Portland, and George G. Collins, 18, Woodbury, N.J.

Charges were dismissed for John S. Eccles, 19, Portland, and William R. Stow, 19, Los Alamitos, Calif. The judge said there was not enough evidence to show they were involved.

The five were suspended from OSU pending outcome of their cases.

They were accused of taking the silver set from the Delta Delta Delta sorority. They said they only wanted to compel the Tri-Delt girls to "put on a function" for their fraternity.

Flemming Elected To National Post

University President Arthur S. Flemming was elected a vice president at large of the National Council of Churches during the council's triennial general assembly in Philadelphia.

President Flemming was also elected vice chairman of the council's General Board, the policy-making arm of the body between triennials. Chairman of the board will be Bishop Reuben H. Mueller, senior bishop of the Evangelical United Brethren Church who was elected Council president.

President Flemming was a vice president of the National Council of Churches from 1950 to 1954. Last month he was elected president of the Oregon Council of Churches.
