Budget Board Cancels Canoe Fete for This Year

The Student Union and Educational Activities Budget Board voted Saturday to cut \$300 from the Student Union budget, \$500 from the ASUO budget, and \$1300 from Programs and to grant a \$3,500 budget increase to the Student Publications Board.

Board members agreed to operate on a \$1,000 deficit as of Jan. 11.

They also voted to notify the Publications Board that Northwest Review, a student literary publication, should not be supported by student fees in the next school year. This concurred with a recommendation of the

Publications Board.

SU Director A. L. (Si) Ellingson also reported that Canoe Fete, normally held during junior weekend, will not be held this year due to obstacles created by construction of the heating plant addition. This is to be officially announced Tuesday by a committee studying the matter.

Ellingson, a nonvoting member of the board, explained that access to the Canoe Fete construction site on the Millrace will be blocked by construction of the plant addition. Construction work is expected to last for a year.

The cuts and remaining deficit are the result of action by the State Board of Higher Educa-

tion, which recently voted to withdraw \$2 of each student's fees from the budget board's funds for its own use. This was a step to meet a revenue loss resulting from the voters' defeat of the Legislature's tax bill.

This resulted in a net loss of funds for the board of \$17,101 with a predicted deficit of \$4,682 for the current academic year. The budget group handles funds for the Student Union, student publications, and related activities.

To meet the loss, the budget board cut 95 cents a term from athletics, 95 cents from student activities, and 10 cents from the gym suit service. Now the Health Service will receive \$7 from student fees; Student Union and educational activities, \$5; athletics, \$5.55; and gym suit service, \$1.90.

During the meeting, the budget board studied revised budgets submitted by Ellingson and discussed various means of cutting expenses.

The board discussed a letter submitted by the Publications board. The publications budget was \$5,062 over the amount requested by the budget board and the letter explained difficulties involved in cutting back publications and losses resulting from the loss of cigarette advertising in The Emerald.

Board Chairman W. C. Jones commented that "it would be nothing less than a disaster if anything happened to the publication of The Emerald."

Ellingson said that the paper has been operating more efficiently since Nov. 1, has already made budget cuts, and serves

In Mac Court

Gov. Wallace To State Views

Alabama Gov. George Wallace, who likes to think of himself as "the leading spokesman for the South in presenting its views to the nation," will speak at 7:30 p.m. in McArthur Court.

Following the speech there will be a question and answer period.

The governor was invited to the campus by University President Phil Sherburne. Sherburne wrote to Wallace after he heard the governor was planning a western tour.

Sherburne will introduce the governor in McArthur Court. University President Arthur Flemming said "Wallace is being brought here by the Associated Students and I believe

he should be introduced by a student."

On his western tour thus far, the governor has given stands for constitutional government and states' rights and has fought against the tyranny of centralized government.

Wallace Experts Agitators

Before leaving Alabama last week, Wallace said, "I expect to run into the professional agitators, the pickets, the left-wingers and the Communists who do not approve of our stand for constitutional government."

Members of the campus and Eugene groups of the Congress of Racial Equality (CORE) will pass out literature outside McArthur Court both before and after the governor's speech. CORE members will wear black arm bands and CORE buttons.

March Scheduled

Eugene CORE members have also scheduled a march at 2:30 p.m. The marchers will carry petitions advocating equal employment and housing in the Eugene area. The petitions will be presented to employers and real estate agents to demonstrate to them the interest by the people of Eugene in discrimination. These petitions will also be available at McArthur Court.

Thursday Flemming denied a request by student CORE leaders for permission to solicit funds inside Mac Court. Fleming turned down CORE's request after the ASUO Senate passed the proposal by a 11-10 vote.

Funds to be Collected

However, CORE will collect funds during the day in the Student Union. The money will be sent to the Student Non-Violent Co-ordinating Committee (SNCC) for a voter registration drive in the South.

Flemming denied CORE's request for security reasons inside McArthur Court. "Some people may feel a necessity to release tensions directly after the speech and any activity that slows the traffic increases the potential that things could get out of control," he said.

Demonstrators Cautioned

Eugene Police Chief Art Ellsworth has cautioned fund collectors not to block the sidewalks in front of the building. He said some 24 officers have been as-

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Principal Urges Wallace Boycott

An elementary school principal has called on ASUO President Phil Sherburne to urge students to boycott Alabama Gov. George Wallace's speech tonight at McArthur Court.

In a letter to Sherburne, Lyle Eddy, elementary principal at Oakland, Oregon, asked the student body president to "use your office to request students to completely disregard his visit to Oregon."

Lyle said, "An empty McArthur Court should give him the impression of our opinion of his actions." He added, "We do not believe that a man who has shown his complete disregard of law and order has anything to offer the students of our university."

Oakland is 20 miles south of Eugene on Highway 99.

Portland, will speak at two CORE-sponsored meetings today. The Rev. Moore will answer questions at an informal discussion at 5:30 p.m. in the SU dining room. He will speak again at 9 p.m. in the SU ballroom.

A demonstration march is scheduled for downtown Eugene today in conjunction with the community CORE group and other local groups. The march will assemble at 18th and Oak at 2 p.m. and will begin to march toward downtown at 2:30.
