Long has, in his photography of Spain, tried to capture the many moods of this colorful country and its great heritage of last character and the will to endure. He presents the people, their farms and cities, their gay carnivals and brooding ruins, and portrays the spirit of contemporary Spain with the fever of new construction in Madrid blended with nostalgia of the past.

A high point in Long's career in documentary film-producing

was the Academy Award for his motion picture, "Fighting Lady," produced when he was a Lieutenant-Commander in the U.S. Navy. He also received the Legion of Merit for the documentary. The only submarine films of World War II belonging to the Navy were procured by Long, who taught periscope photography to the skippers of 80 submarines.

Writing and adventure are a part of Long's career. As a writer he produced "Seven Seas on a Shoestring," published by Harper's and now in its 15th edition. In the line of adventure is his four-year feat in encircling the globe in a 32-foot ketch.
