

# Theologians Set Talks On Calvinist Doctrine

The Rev. Professor Edward A. Dowey, Jr., professor of the history of Christian doctrine in Princeton Theological Seminary, will discuss the "Four Dimensions of Calvin's Reforms" Sunday evening in the ballroom of the Student Union.

The following evening the Rev. Professor Joseph Haroutunian a professor of systematic theology at the University of Chicago, will discuss "God with Us: The Crux of Calvin's Theology." Both speeches are scheduled for 8 p.m. and are open to the public.

Haroutunian is originally from Turkey, where his father was professor of practical theology at the Armenian Evangelical Seminary. After coming to the United States he earned his B.A. and Ph.D. from Columbia University and began teaching at Wellesley College in 1930. Since then he has become professor of systematic theology at the University of Chicago's Divinity School and has published several works.

Among his publications, the best known are a book, "Piety Versus Moralism; the Passing of the New England Theology," a translation and edition of Calvin's "Commentaries" done in collaboration with Professor Louis P. Smith of Wellesley, and the more

recent works, "Wisdom and Folly in Religion" and "Lust For Power."

Dowey is a student of historical theology who gained his B.A. from Lafayette college and his B.D. from Princeton. He has received his M.A. from Columbia and his doctor of theology from the University of Zurich. Publications by Dowey are "The Knowledge of God in Calvin's Theology" and contributions to the Encyclopedia Britannica.

Both speakers are on the West coast to mark the 400th anniversary of the death of Calvin. They have recently appeared with Professor Quirinus Breen of the University history department at a lecture at Lewis and Clark college.

## Senate Loses Quorum for Vote

The Athletic department, the dormitory office, the American Legion, and the faculty will all receive messages from the ASUO Senate this week.

Business at Thursday night's Senate meeting was directed toward these groups and also included a slightly revised procedure for filling Senate vacancies and an informal discussion of proposed constitutional revisions.

The Senate passed a motion stating that charges made by the American Legion that NSA was a Communist-infiltrated organization were unjust. Statements made by the American Legion earlier this year recommended that NSA not be allowed to establish chapters on tax-supported camps.

**Recommend Fee Suspension**  
The Senate also recommended that the dormitory department discontinue the \$2 guest fee currently charged to guests of dormitory residents. Gordie Zimmerman, senator-at-large, recommended that the motion not be passed, stating that the fee was a good way for counselors to know who was spending the night in their dorm.

He observed, "The first thing to remember is that it will not be changed. It has been asked in the past and the dorm. department just won't change it."

The Senate approved recommendations for a more cohesive program of lower-division faculty advisors. The recommendation included a proposal that students receive written advisor approval spring term for courses to be taken the following year.

The group lost its quorum shortly after 8:30 p.m. and before the proposed constitutional revisions had been discussed. Bill St. John, off-campus rep., called for a quorum and demanded that the meeting be adjourned.

**Meeting Adjourned**  
ASUO President Phil Sherburne said he did not feel a quorum was necessary since the Senate would not be asked to vote on the proposals but merely to discuss them. Sherburne finally adjourned the meeting but requested all senators who felt it their duty to remain and discuss the constitution.

Thirteen senators and the ASUO president and vice president remained for the discussion.

Bachelis was elected during the fall term elections. The Senate will appoint his successor.

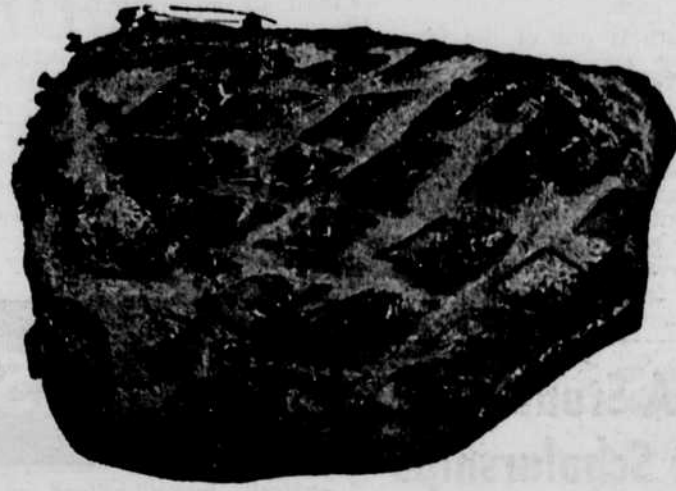
