

Mental Health Talks Slated for Workshop

Leading authorities in the fields of psychology, counseling, health and medicine are listed on the program for the University's 1964 Summer Workshop in Mental Health, June 15-19.

The five-day workshop, sponsored by the School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation, is designed for teachers, public health personnel, health educators and public school administrators, counselors and personnel in allied health, biological and medical sciences.

Coordinator of the workshop is Warren E. Smith, associate professor of health education.

Among the topics to be discussed are "The Emotional Problems of Children," "Group Family Counseling," "The Secondary Student," "Teenage Marriage," "Individual Counseling," "The College Student," "The Drop-Out," "The Suicide Problem," "Mental Illness" and "Drugs and Behavior."

Speakers will be Raymond Lowe, professor of education and director of School Psychological Services at the University; Dr. John L. Cockrell, Eugene obstetrician and gynecologist; Oscar C. Christensen, Jr., counselor at the University Counseling Center; Dr. Clement Vickery, clinical director

of the Oregon State hospital.

Dr. Robert E. Edwards, secretary of the Committee on Pre-clinical Psychopharmacology National Institute, Bethesda, Md.; Rabbi Emanuel Rose, president of the Oregon Mental Health Association; Mrs. John F. Bergman, dean of girls at North Eugene High School; Arthur A. Esslinger, dean of the University School of Health, Physical Education and Recreation.

Thirteen other lectures will also be heard.

The workshop offers two hours of undergraduate or graduate credit. Fee for the course is \$33.

Dick Gregory, Freedom Singers Set Concert

Comedian Dick Gregory, a prominent participant in the civil rights struggle, and the Freedom Singers, six veterans of Southern demonstrations and jails, will present a concert at 8 p.m. Saturday in McArthur Court.

Gregory is currently on a 30-day fund-raising tour for the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee (SNCC).

The Freedom Singers are field workers for the SNCC, and are artists in their own right. They have performed at the Newport Folk Festival and various colleges and universities.

During the past year, Gregory has been active in voter registration drives in Mississippi; consequently, he and his wife have been jailed several times and have had to cancel several performances.

He first became active in the civil rights movement while in high school. He was a track star at a St. Louis, Mo., segregated high school, and he led a march on the Board of Education because the athletic records com-

piled by Negro athletes were not entered in the official record books.

While at Southern Illinois University, Gregory led protest demonstrations against restricted Negro seating in theaters.

Although he has now gained national prominence as a com-

edian, he has continued his active participation in the civil rights movement.
