

Students Supporting Ballot Measure No. 1

Over 200 University students will canvass residential areas in Eugene tonight, passing out information on Ballot Measure No. 1, the Bond Measure for Higher Education.

Merritt Fink, ASUO vice-president, who is co-ordinating the door to door campaign, told The Emerald Tuesday his committee is operating on the assumption that many voters do not understand what is involved in the bond measure.

"So we are trying to get as much information out to the voters as possible," Fink stated.

Students who will be distributing material concerning the bond election should meet at 6 p.m. today in the SU turnaround. Information and maps of areas to be covered will be provided at that time.

Transportation is still needed. Anyone who has not already volunteered and is interested in participating in the project should report to the turn-around at 6 p.m.

In addition to the door-to-door campaign, information will be mailed to some parents of University students within the state.

"The ASUO doesn't have enough money to cover all the parents," Fink commented. "But we are going to try to reach as many parents as possible in the Portland area and Southern Oregon since those were the areas where the vote against the tax referral last October was the heaviest."

Fink has already appeared on several radio programs speaking in support of the Bond Measure and he and his committee have been urging students to write home to their parents asking them to vote in favor of it.

Representatives Disgruntled
Monday, four State Representatives, Richard Kennedy and Richard Eyemann, both Democrats from Lane county, and Republicans Victor Atiyeh, Washington county, and Kessler Cannon of Crook, Deschutes and Jefferson counties, joined in condemning the explanation of Ballot No. 1 that appears in the Oregon Voters' Pamphlet.

They said they were shocked at the explanation, which they said implies that the whole \$30 million bond issue will be repaid through a state-wide property tax.

The last state-wide property tax was levied in 1940 according to the legislators. A number of bond issues have been on the ballot since then, and almost all have identical language referring to the support of the issues through a property tax.

Last Resort
The legislators stated that a property tax for bond retirement would occur only after all the revenues from income tax, liquor sales, and other income sources were exhausted.

If people are persuaded to vote against the bond measure because of the wording of the explanation in the voters pamphlet, local property taxes "will undoubtedly be increased," they said.

Currently State agencies face a "difficult and complex problem" in planning their 1965-67 budgets, according to Freeman Holmer, state director of finance and administration.

He said that failure of the \$30 million higher education bond issue at Friday's election could have a great impact on the new budget.

Famous Musician Appearing Friday

An internationally-known classical musician will appear on the campus Friday night.

Eva Heinitz, member of the University of Washington music department faculty and performer on the viola da gamba, will give a concert at 8 p.m. Friday in the School of Music auditorium. The concert is open to the public at no cost.

Appearing with her will be John Hamilton, assistant professor of music, who will play the harpsichord.

Miss Heinitz, a native of Berlin, Germany, trained at the Berlin Academy of Music and in Paris before beginning her concert career at the age of 17.

She has appeared as a soloist with the Berlin Philharmonic, the Orchestre Symphonique de Paris, and in New York City. In recent years she has toured the United States and South America in solo concert and orchestral appearances.

Sponsors of the concert are the University Honors College and the School of Music.

It is being held in connection with the Honors College spring term colloquium dealing with "Baroque Art."

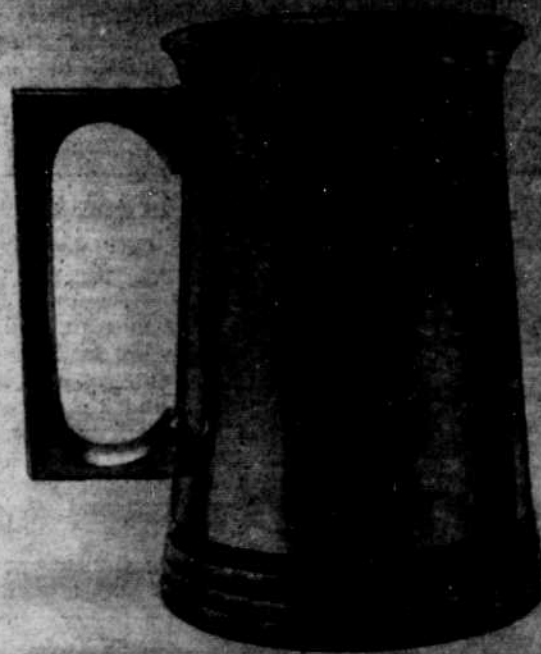
Stanley Maveety, assistant professor of English, will be tonight's discussion leader.

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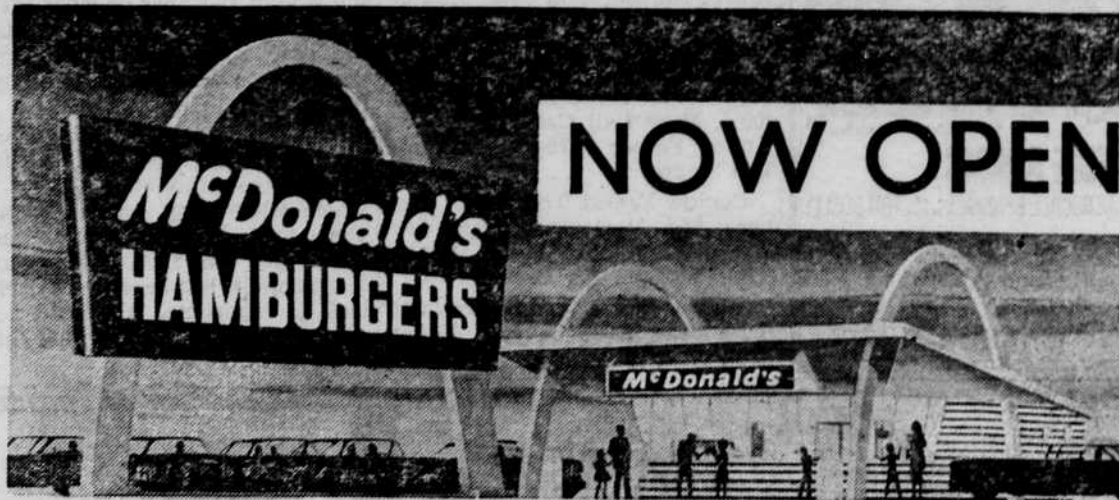
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
