

Methodist Missionary Includes UO in Tour

Steve Smith, a member of the Campus Travel Staff for the National Methodist Student Movement and a former short-term missionary in Bolivia, is staying at the University during his tour of campuses until today.

He is traveling to different campuses during the academic year 1964-65 to talk with students about the relationship of the Methodist Church to the situation in Latin America today, especially in regard to the challenge it represents to the Student Christian Movement. He has been meeting with students interested in discovering the many and varied opportunities for service with the church in critical areas and situations, both in the U.S. and overseas.

Smith, who graduated from Southern Methodist University in Dallas, Tex., in 1960, with a major in comparative literature and a minor in Spanish, acted as a short-term missionary in Bolivia for three years. While there he served as a teacher, pastor, social worker, counselor and director of a secondary school in Cochabamba.

His relationship with the young people of Bolivia was very close and his term was spent in close involvement with the life of the people with whom he worked. Through his work he gained an insight into the tensions and problems which face the country today in its many aspects.

Prior to his term in Bolivia, Smith worked for seven weeks in Bolivia in the summer of 1956 in church construction, aiding in study halls in schools and helping the local youth groups.

He said that much attention should be focused on the fact that we should relate to these people not only on the nation-to-nation basis but also on a person-to-person basis.

He continued that the threat of Communism is still only a "threat," but if the basic social conditions of poverty, sickness and ignorance are ignored by the rest of the world, the Communists can get an easy foothold in Latin America through promises and propaganda.

Smith is presently enrolled in Perkins School of Theology in Dallas, Tex., and hopes to be able to continue in the Campus Mis-

sionary work in the U.S. or overseas.

He spoke to the Wesley Foundation Sunday evening about his experiences and services. Steve is available for questions or interviews through the Wesley Foundation until today.

Cartoonist Exhibits Original Artwork

A collection of over 5,000 original cartoons by Quincy Scott of Nehalem, Oregon, editorial cartoonist of the Portland Oregonian for nearly 20 years, is currently on exhibit in the University library.

The collection represents a running contemporary commentary on the political and social scene, both state and national, and in that sense is a major historical document. In addition, it is valuable as part of the history of illustration itself.

A few of Scott's originals are in museums in the East, but the collection given to the library is probably the most complete collection of an individual cartoonist in any library. It has value for research by students of graphic art and by historians.

In addition to the cartoons for the Oregonian, the collection includes earlier work done for New York newspapers, and for book and magazine illustrations. The artist was particularly adept at drawing animals, and his cartoons are marked by a liberal use of the Aesopian method, with illustrations rather than words.

Another hallmark of the Scott cartoon is the classic allusion, reflecting the artist's early education and family background.

Mr. Scott was born in Ohio in 1882, the son of Walter Q. Scott, president of Ohio State University. His early cartoon work was done in New York, where he was influenced to some extent by another Oregon cartoonist, Homer Davenport. He was Oregonian cartoonist from 1931 to 1949.

The collection is a major addition to the library's cartoon holdings, which include the work of George Hager, Edward S. "Tige" Reynolds, and Homer Davenport.
