New Institute to Study Industry and Labor

The fields of labor and management will be studied and served by a new interdisciplinary institute established at the University.

Called the Institute of Industrial and Labor Relations, it is under the general administration of the graduate school. Paul L. Kleinsorge, professor of economics, is acting director.

Other faculty members associated with the institute are Edwin F. Beal, professor of personnel and industrial management, and Robert Dubin, research professor of sociology.

Research will be oriented toward the state of Oregon. Areas of interest will include manpower resources, labor mobility, wage structures, personnel problems, management and labor organizations, communications, labor legislation, and collective bargaining.

In the development of its re-

search program, the institute is closely associated with the Bureau of Business and Economic Research.

Public service aspects of the institute will include labor education and management development programs, including regular courses on the campus, evening classes through the Division of Continuing Education, special seminars, and conferences on specific subjects in the field.

This public service program will be carried out in co-operation with advisors drawn from labor, management, government, and the University.

It is planned to include an information service on industrial and labor relations topics, and the maintenance of an industrial relations library in the University library.

The program of graduate study set up under the institute leads to the M.A. or M.S. degree. Two students are working for advanced degrees under the program this fall.

No undergraduate program is offered and no new courses have been established, according to Kleinsorge.

He said institutes similar to the new one at Oregon are operating at the University of California, UCLA, and Stanford on the West Coast, and throughout the country at such schools as Cornell, Princeton, the University of Illinois, and the University of Wisconsin.

UO Specialists to Discuss American Dilemma in Asia

A panel of three University specialists on the Far East will present a discussion of the "American Dilemma in South East Asia" in the Browsing Room lecture at 7:30 p.m. Wednesday in the SU.

Panel members include moderator John F. Gange, director of the University's Institute of International Studies and Overseas Administration; Paul S. Dull, professor of history, and Charles P. Schliecher, professor of political science.

All three panel members have had extensive experience in the Far East, particularly in South East Asia.

Gange came to the University from the Asia Foundation in 1961. He was a participant in the first Asian-American Assembly in Malaya in 1963. Gange has recently had articles published in Nation magazine as well as the Annals of American Political and Social Sciences. He is expected to in-

roduce the problems in South East Asia.

Dull is an historian of note on the Far East, specializing in the Orient and having extensive experience in Japan. During the past year, Dull was a visiting professor at Stanford University. He will evaluate the role of the Soviet Union and Communist China in South East Asia.

Schliecher has been a member of the University faculty since 1947 and has traveled widely in the Far East. He will analyze American policies and progress in the area.

A general discussion period will follow the panel discussion.

The discussion is open to the public free of charge.

Coast Guard Sets OCS Interviews
