

Bus Service Possible In UO Housing Areas

A city bus route may be set up to serve Westmoreland and Amazon housing areas if enough consumer interest is shown.

John Morrison, investigating for the ASUO, discussed the program with the president of the Emerald Transportation System, Robert Keefe, Thursday. Keefe indicated if enough students indicated that they would use bus transportation, he would consider starting another route.

Service Projects Committee Seeks Volunteer Workers

Letters explaining the ASUO service projects have been sent to all University living organizations, and names of students interested in working on some type of service project are being collected by the committee in charge of the program.

Dave Noall, chairman of the ASUO service projects committee, said at a meeting of the committee Thursday night that the letters give examples of the type of work and openings available through the program.

Committee members will be contacting each living organization early next week for names of persons interested in participating in a service project.

The ASUO committee, Noall said, serves as a publicity and recruiting organization on the campus for the Community Volunteer Office in Eugene. Names received by the ASUO committee will be referred to the downtown office, which will assign them to service projects.

Members of the service projects include Susan Whipple, Mary Piper and Karen Young. The committee will meet again at 9 p.m. Tuesday in the Student Union.

Morrison has asked all students living in Westmoreland and Amazon housing developments, who would use bus transportation, to sign up in the ASUO president's office this week and next. The president's office is on the third floor of the Student Union.

Morrison stressed several hundred students would have to indicate an interest in using the bus route to assure its development. There are over 400 units in Westmoreland and 200 in Amazon.

Keefe told Morrison he would consider a bus route running every hour or half-hour from Westmoreland and Amazon districts directly to the campus and then returning. The busses would make a minimum number of stops and follow a direct route to the campus. The proposed route would run from 7 a.m. to 6 p.m.

Morrison said at the present time he was not attempting to establish any other bus routes. Such routes might be formed later if concentrations of students needing transportation could be plotted.

The Decoys and the Drakes will have a function at 10 a.m. Saturday at Tino's.

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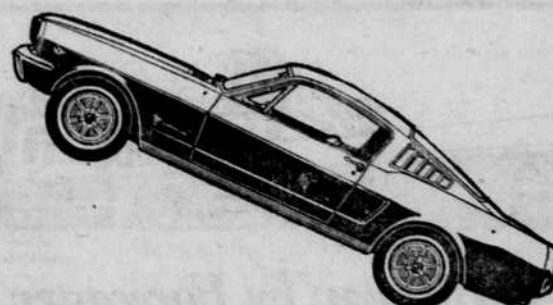
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
