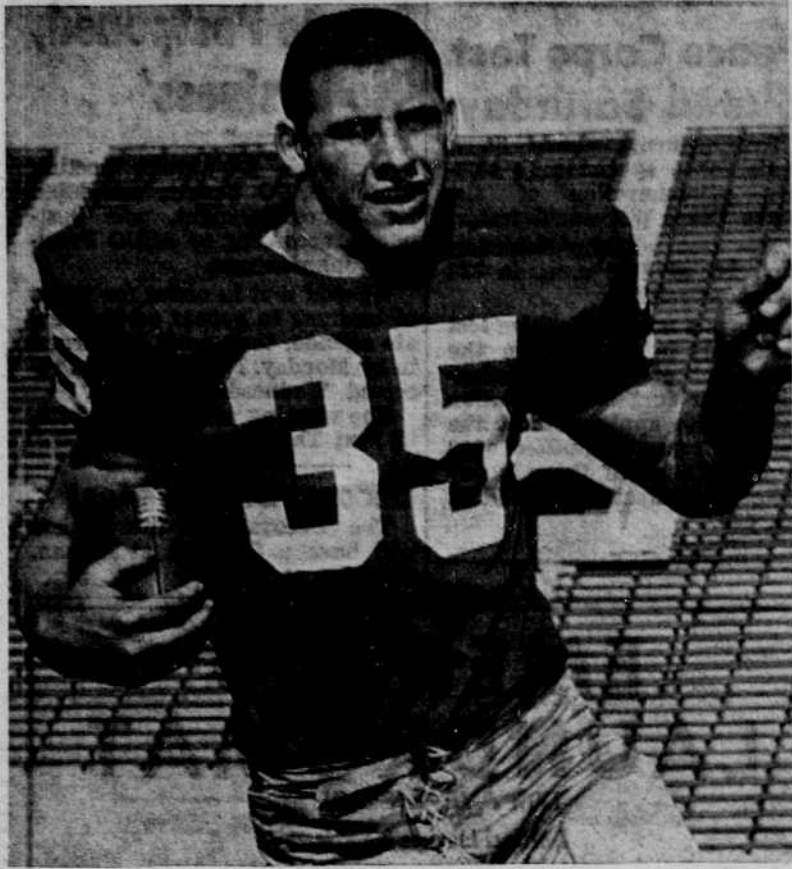

Berry Able to Play

Bob Berry will be able to play against Indiana.

That's the word from Oregon head coach Len Casanova.

Will Berry start? "That depends on the situation," says Cas. With that encouraging news the Webfoots are off to Bloomington for their second encounter in history with the Hoosiers.

No one is likely to forget last year's game at Multnomah Stadium in Portland. Oregon won, 28-22 when Berry passed 30 yards to H. D. Murphy for a touchdown with 11 seconds left in the game.

With either Berry or Mike Brundage at quarterback, the Ducks will rely on passing for a good share of their offensive yardage. Berry is one of the na-

tion's leaders in passing, although his inactivity last week brought him down a few places.

Hoosiers Pass, Too

Indiana also has a passing attack and will probably give the Oregon defense one of its toughest games all year. Rich Badar, Indiana's quarterback, is also one of the nation's leaders in passing.

Casanova said that he felt Indiana's passing game would probably be more dangerous than their ground game. Besides Badar the Hoosiers have an excellent end in Bill Malinchak, according to Casanova.

Les Palm is back off the injury list and will play against Indiana. Palm is a defensive halfback who is averaging one interception per game. His return should help the Duck secondary. Ron Martin and Tim Temple are the other Duck defensive halfbacks.

Last Year: UO 28 Hoosiers 22

Oregon quarterback Bob Berry took the snap from center.

He faded back, looking for a receiver in the end zone. Then he threw.

The pass looked too high but suddenly Duck halfback H. D. Murphy leaped into the air and snagged the ball, falling into the end zone.

Oregon had beaten Indiana, 28-22.

That was the way it was last year in the most thrilling game of Oregon's season.

It was a seesaw battle all the way. The Hoosiers moved into a 13-6 lead in the first half as fullback Tom Nowatzke and quarterback Richie Badar led the way. Oregon's score came on a Berry pass.

Mel Renfro led the Ducks into a 14-13 lead but Indiana came right back to retake the lead. Berry threw his second of three touchdown passes to put Oregon in the lead but Nowatzke put the Hoosiers ahead again on a 26-yard field goal by Nowatzke. That set the stage for Berry's game winning pass.

The Oregon defense won't be able to relax against the Indiana ground game either. The Hoosiers have All-Big Ten fullback Tom Nowatzke going for them. Last year the Ducks stopped Nowatzke and are hoping to do it again.

Up front on the Oregon defensive unit are linebackers Harry Cartales and Tim Casey, ends Rob Haskins and Oliver McKenney, guards Jack Clark, Gary Davis or Doug Inman, and tackles Ancer Haggerty and Jim Kollmann. Kollmann missed last week's game with an infected elbow.

Casanova classified the Hoosiers as an explosive team which has had hard luck this year. "They have hurt themselves with fumbles and penalties," he said.

Could Have Top Record

With a little more time they could have had a real good record, said Casanova. They could have tied Ohio State with one more play and lost, 21-20, to Iowa as the game ended with Indiana on the Iowa one-yard line.

If Berry or Brundage are going to be able to pass, the Duck offensive line will have to handle Hoosiers that are bigger than they are. Lowell Dean, Pat Matson, Dale Wilson, Mark Richards and Dave Tobey have been more than capable this year.

The Webfoots will be hoping for a dry day so ends Corky Sullivan and Ray Palm and flanker-back Steve Bunker will be able to run their pass patterns with out added difficulty.

Halfback Dennis Keller and fullback Dick Winn will be the other starters in the backfield.

Oregon over Indiana by two. Call it an educated guess. Call it optimism. Call it hope. But we think the Ducks can take the Hoosiers, even at Bloomington.

Oregon State over Stanford by three. The Beavers are hoping to dam up anybody's chances to get to the Rose Bowl. And we think they can do it by beating Stanford. But the Indians are not going to bow easily.

Washington over UCLA by four. The Huskies have won two in a row. UCLA dropped a game to the Air Force last Saturday. The fact that the game is being played in Seattle also prompts our choice for UW as the winner.

Washington State over Texas Tech by one. The Ducks caught a glimpse of the strengths of the Cougars. In our estimation, Texas Tech and the people of Lubbock, Tex., will see more than just a glimpse.

California over Utah by six. In their last two games the Redskins have racked up a total of 88 points, but their opponents were Texas Western and BYU. Utah will meet the test against the Bears and Craig Morton... and flunk.

Idaho over Utah State by four. Utah State has also run up some high scores—wins such as 76-0, 41-0, and 51-7. But their opponents were not of the quality that Idaho possesses. The Vandals will put a large crimp in Utah State's scoring punch.

Nationally speaking...
Notre Dame over Michigan State by six. The Irish had a close brush with defeat last Saturday. The Spartans, however unwilling they may be, will prove to be the scapegoats for Notre Dame.

Alabama over Georgia Tech by four. The Crimson Tide are unbeaten and untied in eight games. The Engineers have a 7-1 record, and will be quite anxious to topple the 'Bama team. Such will not be the case, however.

Arkansas over Southern Methodist by ten. The Razorbacks are leading the Southwest Conference. The Mustangs are bringing up the rear in the same race. Arkansas will add one more game to their unbeaten and untied record.

Nebraska over Oklahoma State by 11. The Cornhuskers, rated number four in the nation, are

Their offense is not overpowering, but their defense is strong (46 points allowed in seven games). It should be a bleak Saturday for Mississippi State.



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
