

Pacific NW Assembly Hosts Kenneth Keating

Three distinguished speakers, including a former U.S. senator, a congressman, and an educator, will headline the program of the University co-sponsored Pacific Northwest Assembly at the Village Green in Cottage Grove, Feb. 11-14.

Kenneth B. Keating, former senator from New York; Richard W. Bolling, Congressman from Missouri; and Samuel P. Huntington, professor of government at Harvard University, will give the main addresses during the four-day assembly.

The Pacific Northwest Assembly, which will consider the general theme of Congress and America's Future, is a regional counterpart of the American Assembly of Columbia University. Opinion leaders from throughout the Northwest and Alaska will participate in the meetings and discuss the problems of Congressional reform.

Republican Leader

Keating, Republican from New York, served in the U.S. Senate from 1958 until his defeat in the November, 1964, election by Democrat Robert F. Kennedy, former U.S. attorney general.

Keating has had an outstanding career in government service.

He was in the U.S. Congress for six sessions before election to the Senate. He is considered one of the strong leaders in the Republican party.

Representative Richard W. Bolling of Missouri has represented his state in the U.S. Congress since 1949. A prominent Democrat, he is one of the recognized party leaders in the Congress, serving on many important committees.

Harvard Professor

Professor Huntington's career includes education, writing and government service. He is a former associate director of the Institute of War and Peace Studies, Columbia University, and has been professor of government at Harvard University since 1962. He has served as consultant in the

field of military policy to numerous government and private organizations. The author of many books and articles, his most recent publication is the co-authored "Political Power: USA-USSR."

Director of the 1965 Pacific Northwest Assembly is Lester G. Seligman, University professor of political science.

Five Piano Recitals Slated Winter Term

Four guest pianists and one University faculty member will perform in a series of recitals to be held during the months of January and February at the University School of Music auditorium.

The first recital will be Thursday, Jan. 7, at 8 p.m. Rebecca Penneys of Los Angeles, who has been selected as an American contestant to participate in February in the Chopin International Piano Competition in Warsaw, Poland, will present a program of Chopin's works.

Second in the series will be a program to be held on Thursday, Jan. 14, at 8 p.m. by Wendell Nelson, faculty member of the University of California at Santa Barbara. Nelson will perform works of Mozart, Brahms and Prokofiev.

Ronald Tarr, member of the Oregon State University piano faculty, will present the third recital on Thursday, Jan. 28, at 8 p.m. His program will include works by Beethoven, Bach, Dahl, Brahms and Ravel.

The fourth and final guest recital will be Tuesday, Feb. 9, at 8 p.m. Joan Benson of Stanford University, will perform works for clavichord from the 17th and 18th centuries.

Gabriel Chodos, instructor in piano at the University, will present a piano recital of works by Mozart, Beethoven and Chopin on Tuesday, Feb. 16.

The public is cordially invited to attend all five recitals and no admission will be charged.

A new award for student creative writing at the University has been announced.

The \$50 prize, donated by Mr. and Mrs. Arthur F. Hunter of Portland, will be called the Hunter Prize for Creative Writing.

Hunter is the son of the late Frederick M. Hunter, honorary chancellor of the State System of Higher Education.

The prize will be awarded to a University senior or graduate student writing the best single piece of creative fiction. Competition will include poetry, short story, drama, and novel.

Work will be judged and winner determined by a committee centered in the University Department of English and headed by James B. Hall, professor of English. A consulting committee member from outside the University is to be named.

Prize money will be administered through the University Development Fund.

Mortar Board will meet at 7 p.m. today in SU. Attendance is required of all members.

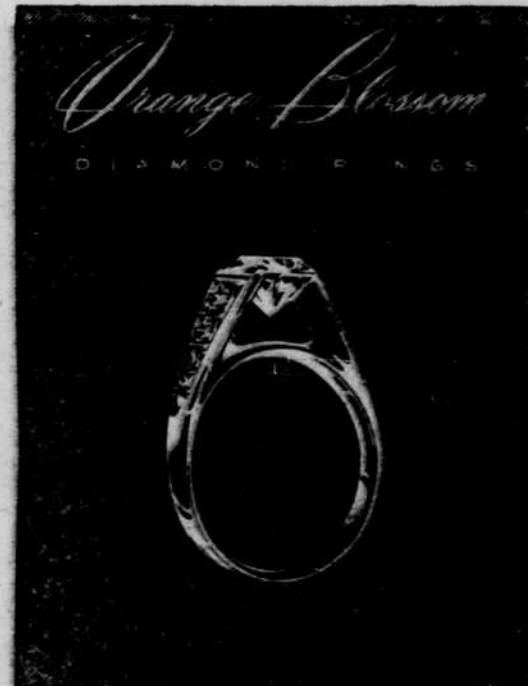
An International Education Center staff meeting will be held at 7 p.m. on Thursday in SU.
