

Officials Forsee Science Addition

The \$3,095,000 second addition to the University Science Building, number one on the priority list of the Capital Construction Program of the State System of Higher Education, will undoubtedly be approved by this session of the legislature.

Of the total cost, \$570,000 is expected to be financed from federal grants, leaving a state fund requirement of \$2,525,000. An application has been filed with the Housing and Home Finance Agency for funds to finance the preparation of working drawings and specifications.

It is expected that the new building will provide a net increase of approximately 257 classroom student stations and 246 laboratory student stations, as well as approximately 22,826 square feet of graduate instruction-research space, 21,522 square feet of library space and 8,257 square feet devoted to special purposes. These will include shop, instrument, preparation, and other special use areas.

It will be constructed of reinforced concrete on three levels and will be physically connected to the existing east wing of the Science Building.

Emergency Action Praised by Morse

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Wayne Morse, D-Ore., told the Senate Wednesday new legislation will be needed to assist flood-ravaged areas in the Pacific Northwest.

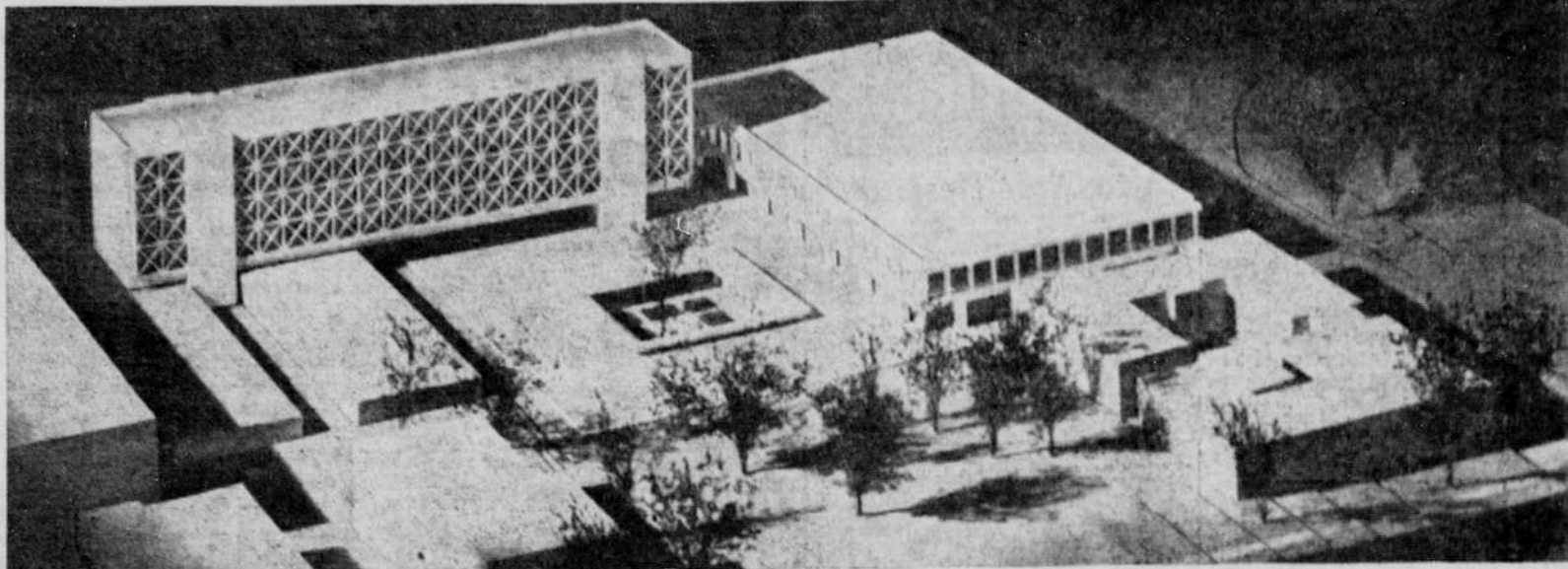
Morse said he has the highest praise for the emergency efforts of the federal government. He also praised the work of state governments in responding to the emergency.

But he said Congress has an "obligation to proceed with dispatch" to the enactment of legislation that also is needed. He did not spell out the legislation, but said he believes low-interest loans should be part of the assistance program.

Guest Recital Features Brahms, Mozart Works

The second of four pianists will present a guest recital at 8 p.m. Thursday in the School of Music auditorium.

Wendell Nelson, assistant professor of music at the University of California at Santa Barbara, will perform works of Brahms, Mozart, Prokofiev, and Peter Racine Fricker. Fricker is a visiting professor from London at the University of California at Santa Barbara.

Selections included in Nelson's program will be the Sonata in B-Flat Major, K.333, by Mozart; three piano pieces from Op. 118 by Brahms; Fourteen Aubades by Fricker; and Sonata No. 6, Op. 82, by Prokofiev.

Nelson received his B.A. degree from Pomona College, his Master of Music degree from the University of Michigan, and his Doctor of Music degree from Northwestern University.

He was the first pianist to be admitted to the Doctor of Music program at Northwestern. As part of his requirement for the degree, Nelson gave a series of historic piano recitals, including work ranging over the entire literature for piano.

He taught at Northwestern for two years before coming to the University of California at Santa Barbara. He has toured the West in concert, frequently playing music for two pianos with his wife, Marjorie Nelson.

In a concert tour of Europe last spring, Nelson appeared in

Greece under the auspices of the United States Information Service, and performed at a USIS-sponsored concert at the Centre Culturel Americain in Paris and at concerts in Wigmore Hall in London and for the BBC.

In three concerts with Paganini Quartet, Nelson has appeared as a featured soloist.

The public is invited to the concert and no admission will be charged.

Governor Grants Pardon to Beck

OLYMPIA — Governor Rossellini of Washington granted a pardon to Dave Beck Sunday night, lifting the 70-year-old former Teamsters' Union president from legal stigma of a grand larceny conviction.

The action was taken "to restore to Mr. Beck the civil rights lost by reason of his conviction and will remove him from the supervision of the Washington State Parole Board," said Rossellini.

Beck's conviction was for allegedly embezzling \$1,900 from the sale of a union-owned automobile.
