

# Juniors Needed By Peace Corps

The Peace Corps is searching for college Juniors who are interested in training for the Peace Corps during the summer prior to their Senior year. You would be part of the advanced training program of the Peace Corps, now in its second year of operation. Training will last for two months this summer at an American college or University. In September trainees will resume their normal studies. Trainees will spend another four to six weeks in training after they receive their degrees and, after

final selection, will depart for their assigned projects.

Juniors selected for this program will receive travel allowances to cover transportation to and from the training center and a modest living allowance during the training. Selection will be the same as that used for all Peace Corps applicants.

It is based on an evaluation of the candidates' background as revealed in the Peace Corps Questionnaire, Placement Test results and character references. Evaluation will continue during training, and final selection will not be made until the end of the second stage of training following graduation from college.
