

# Frosh, Clark Split Twin Bill

The Oregon Frosh, behind the hard hitting of outfielder Mike Stoll and the four-for-four performance of catcher Bob Lindsay, split a twin bill with the Clark College Penguins at Howe Field Wednesday.

The Ducklings routed the visitors 9-2 in the opener behind the strong right arm of Larry Hills, but dropped the nightcap 3-1.

In the opener, Stoll drilled two doubles to drive in three runs in the Ducklings' 15 hit attack.

Bob Lindsay had four singles in the first game and drove in one run. In addition, leftfielder Steve Jones drove in two runs with two singles before leaving the game for spring football drills.

Garry Markley was also able to garner two RBIs while winning pitcher Larry Hills drove in the other Oregon tally.

Hills went the distance to record the win.

Coach Howard Fetz credited his team with one of its better performances of the season. "We played good all around ball and our team work was good."

The Ducklings win was all the more impressive considering the Sheldon Irish dumped the Frosh 7-4 Tuesday at Sheldon High School.

In the second game, the Penguins scored two unearned runs off loser Mike Nicksic when Nicksic's attempted pick-off throw to second went into centerfield and two runs scored.

Bruce Robb, Bob Zwick, Phil Olrich, Dave Heuberger, and Steve Beckham each garnered singles for the Frosh.

The Ducklings were unable to get a big rally going and stranded many runners on base.

Mike Snow relieved Nicksic in the fifth and gave up one run through his three inning stint on the mound.

In the last inning, shortstop Steve Beckham was hit in the head but his protective helmet absorbed most of the shock. He was removed from the field on a stretcher and taken to the hospital for observation.

# Former Students In Peace Corps

The University Placement Service recently received an extensive list of former University students currently working in the Peace Corps. Stationed in all parts of the world as of Feb. 28 are 109 individuals. The Service also received a listing of 13 students who have completed their service.

These numbers support the findings of Dan Dodd, former head of the Campus Peace Corps, who says that the West Coast has produced the most volunteers in the country. The state of Oregon alone boasts the highest percentage per capita of volunteers of any state.

Volunteers from the University are scattered throughout South America, Africa, and Asia, with eleven in Turkey, nine in Nigeria and eight each in Brazil, Liberia, Peru and Chile.

# YAF to Discuss Plans For Campaign Tonight

Young Americans for Freedom will discuss its campaign to support U.S. action in Viet Nam at its meeting tonight at 7:30 in the SU.

Last week YAF sponsored a table at the SU and distributed information on Viet Nam and petitions endorsing U.S. policy there. YAF plans to have a table Friday on the same subject. Next week the group will start circulating its petitions in living organizations.

YAF is also sponsoring a speech on Viet Nam at 8 p.m. Friday in the SU Ballroom. Speaking will be the Rev. Daniel Lyons, director of forensics and professor of social economics at Gonzaga University. Father Lyons has written more than 100 articles for various publications and has been a frequent visitor to

Southeast Asia and Viet Nam.

Other business at the YAF meeting tonight will include a discussion of the Western YAF Regional Conference in San Francisco last weekend. Three University YAF members attended. Speakers at the Conference included Warren Coats, chairman of the University of California, at Berkeley, Young Republicans. Coats was a member of the executive board of the Free Speech Movement until the YR's criticized the course FSM actions had taken and withdrew from the movement.

YAF will also make plans for membership recruiting at the beginning of Fall Term and hear a record on economics by Henry Hazlitt, Newsweek columnist.

# Last Concert Due Thursday

Music composed and performed by students will be featured during the University Symphony Orchestra's last concert of the season at 8 p.m. Thursday, in the School of Music auditorium. No admission will be charged, and the public is invited to attend.

The 70-member orchestra, directed by George G. Boughton, associate professor of violin at the University, will perform three major compositions. First on the program will be "Concerto for Two Horns in E-flat Major" by George Telemann. Soloists will be Edward Kammerer, and Kevin McGillivray.

Jon Appleton, a graduate student in composition at the University, wrote the second selection on the program "After 'Nude Descending a Staircase.'" This composition was written in lieu of a thesis for a Master of Music degree, and is intended to be a tribute to Duchamp's painting.

Gustav Mahler's "Symphony No. 1" will be the final number of the program. Members of the Orchestra selected this symphony for performance because they feel the music is "very personal, warm and tuneful."

## Professor Publishes

An article on insurance settlements in the Roseburg disaster has won a national award for a University professor of insurance, Mark R. Greene, acting dean of the School of Business at the University.

Greene's article on "The Effect of Insurance Settlements in a Disaster," published in the September 1964 issue of "The Journal of Risk and Insurance," won the \$150 award from the National Association of Independent Insurers.

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
