

Chicago Symphony to Give Performance Here May 18

As part of a western tour, the Chicago Symphony Orchestra will perform in concert at the University May 18. The orchestra is under the direction of Jean Martinon, a former student of both Albert Roussel and Charles Munch.

The Chicago Symphony is the nation's third oldest symphony orchestra, following the New York and Boston orchestras. Beginning in 1891 as a full-time cultural addition to Chicago and its stockyards, the orchestra has since grown to 103 musicians, making up what Igor Stravinsky called "the best orchestra in the world."

The symphony performs not only on tours, but also in subscription concerts, and popular concerts—established in 1914 to "bring the best of music to the people at modest prices."

It also travels around the Chicago school system, holding concerts and demonstrations in grammar and high schools. Last March the symphony held two concerts of contemporary music at the University of Chicago un-

der a Rockefeller Foundation Grant.

The basic orchestral season is 30 consecutive weeks, but, as basic seasons go, a five-week tour season has been added to the original season.

Has Permanent Base

The Chicago Symphony operates from a permanent base, Orchestra Hall, during its season. The symphony was the first in the country to have a permanent home.

Early leaders of the Chicago Symphony became tired of searching Europe for their musicians and began an apprentice orchestra of their own. The apprentice Civic Orchestra was founded as a trainer and supplier for the Chicago Symphony and other U.S. orchestras with native American players.

The Civic Orchestra is an informal edition of the Chicago Symphony, comprised of an assorted number of instruments and various costumes such as sneakers and loafers with knee socks. Musicians' ages vary from 20 to 40.

About 50 members of the 103

musicians in the Chicago Symphony are graduates of the Civic Orchestra. Currently there are 50 members in the Civic group.

Jean Martinon Director

Director of the Chicago Symphony, Jean Martinon, took over direction of the orchestra in 1963. Martinon was born in France and studied violin at the Paris National Conservatory, where he was an outstanding student. He also studied composing. He was later awarded the Grand Prize of Paris for his "Psalm 136—Song of the Captives." Martinon composed this work following the war and a period as a German prisoner of war.

Before he assumed leadership of the Chicago Symphony, Martinon appeared as a guest conductor with the orchestra in 1960 and 1962.

The symphony will play three works when it appears May 18. Rossini's overture to "The Journey to Rheims," Roussel's Symphony No. 3 in G minor, and Beethoven's Symphony No. 3 in E flat major ("Eroica") will be the featured works.

Ticket Sale Friday For Senior Banquet

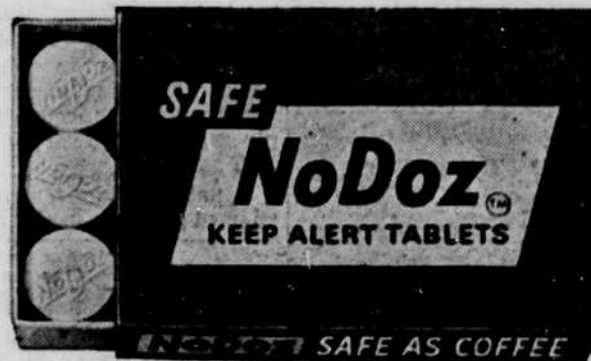
