Going into the final event of the meet, the 400-yard freestyle sprint relay, the score was tied, 44-44.

Sprinters Speedy

Oregon's top-notch freestylers took over from here. Greening opened up a quick lead in the first 100-yard leg of the relay, and Don Smith, Dave MacKenzie, and Hess lengthened the edge to where Oregon won going away at 3:25. California finished at 3:31.

"Our sprinters are the strongest part of our team. The relay swimmers work well together," commented Van Rossen.

Jay Southard, captain of the Golden Bears, took first place in the 200-yard backstroke, swam for the winning 400-yard medley quartet and placed third in the 200-yard individual medley.

Southard and Barry Weitzenberg, who took two firsts, dominated the California scoring.

Van Rossen said his team was mentally prepared for the meets and he was pleased with the overall performances.

He then commented on the journey to Los Angeles this weekend, during which the Ducks will challenge two of the conference powers, UCLA and USC.

"UCLA is tougher than Stanford. They will battle USC and Stanford for the league's top spot," he predicted.

Pavia Program To Be Outlined

Students interested in spending a year studying in Europe have the opportunity at the Italian Studies Center, a program for state college and university students in Oregon.

James Hugon, who will be the center's associate director next fall will visit the University Wednesday to meet prospective applicants from 1:30-5 p.m. in Room 423, Friendly Hall.

Students unable to meet with Hugon should see John Gange, director of International Studies, or write Hugon at the Office of International Programs, Portland State College.

The center is located at the University of Pavia in northern Italy, about 20 miles from Milan. Some 50 Oregon students are now studying there in the center's third year of operation.

Cost of studying for a year at Pavia is about the same as a year of college in Oregon, with the addition of round trip transportation. Estimated cost is \$2,100, including tuition, transportation, room and board, and books. Some financial assistance is available.

The curriculum will be expanded next fall to include 90 quarter hours of courses in business, economics, history, literature, government, art, philosophy and Italian language. Emphasis is on Europe.

The offering of courses in business and economics is part of a special one-year program in international business administration which will include summer management trainee positions with European business firms.

Courses, with the exception of Italian, are taught in English by the faculty of the University of Pavia and visiting faculty from Oregon. Coursework is acceptable for credit in all of Oregon's state colleges and universities.

To qualify for the program, students must have completed at least one year of college work and be enrolled in a college or university of the state system. Selection of the 50 students for next fall's program will be based on character reference, aptitude and academic record.

Students from schools outside

the state system must apply for admittance to an Oregon state college or university, in addition to applying for the overseas program.

The overseas center provides students an opportunity to increase their understanding of Europe and its people. It offers personal experience with European institutions and ways of life.

The 700-year-old University of Pavia, is one of Europe's oldest with an enrollment of 15,000, is located within easy traveling distance of many of Europe's major cities.

Oxford Scholar To Discuss Law

Oxford University professor, David Daube, will lecture on "Rhetoric and the Law" at 8 p.m. today in Room 3, Fenton Hall.

Daube, regius professor of civil law, is a fellow of All Soul's College at Oxford University. He is considered by many to be one of Britain's most outstanding scholars of the humanities. His special interests are in the fields of Roman law, Oriental law, and jurisprudence.

He will speak to faculty and students of the School of Law at 3 p.m. today on "Novel Trends in Legal History."

Daube holds degrees from Cambridge, Oxford, Edinburgh, and Gottinger universities. He has written several books on Biblical and Roman law. These include "Studies in Biblical Law," "Forms of Roman Legislation," and "The Exodus Pattern in the Bible."

His appearance is sponsored by the Assembly and University Lectures Committee.

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
