

Peace Corps Week Slates Movie, Panel, Tests, Tent

University President Arthur S. Flemming formally opened Peace Corps Week Tuesday with a proclamation urging "all members of the University community to become acquainted with the Peace Corps program."

In a short ceremony, Flemming said, "much of the strength of the Peace Corps has come from the young people on the campuses of our colleges and universities."

Peace Corps representatives arrived at the University early this week to begin planning for a week-long recruiting and information drive Jan. 16-21.

Peace Corps representatives will concentrate during the week on supplying information about the program, providing discussion, and administering tests.

As in previous years, Corps representatives are comprised of former volunteers and agency officials.

Reclassification Void; Draft Not Punitive

WASHINGTON (AP)—A Justice Department official said in a letter made public Tuesday that the draft laws cannot be used to muffle any "constitutionally protected" expression of views — such as student protests against U.S. actions in Viet Nam.

The letter, from Asst. Atty. Gen. Fred M. Vinson Jr., was made public by Sen. Philip Hart, D-Mich., who had protested Selective Service Director Lewis Hershey's action to re-classify as 1A a number of University of Michigan youths involved in a draft board sit-in.

Hershey had told Hart in a letter that he was authorized by a presidential executive order to reclassify men "found to be delinquent under the Selective Service Act."

Hart had asked the Justice Department to comment on that.

sional school. Associate Dean of Faculties Charles Duncan said chances are good that the program will be accredited once it is a separate professional school.

If the faculty approves the motions to establish the two new professional schools, President Flemming will have to request permission from the State Board of Higher Education to do so. This will undoubtedly take some time, since the faculty will have to approve the final plans that will be submitted to the Board.

Besides discussing the two new schools, the faculty will also vote on a motion to amend the group offense section of the Student Conduct Code. Chairman Wendell Basye, representing the Student Conduct Committee, will plead the Committee's case concerning the suggestion to delete the word "law" from section I.D. of the Code.

Unanimous Recommendation

The recommendation, which was passed unanimously by the four faculty members and three students serving on the Conduct Committee, is intended to make University-recognized groups responsible for complying with University regulations, and will delete civil law from any part of the Code.

In other words, Conduct Committee members have said that they feel that their recommendation will make the group offense section of the Code compatible with the philosophy of

Oregonian Charged After Berlin Escape

BERLIN (AP) — A former Portland State College student faces possible court marshall for helping three persons escape from East Berlin.

Pfc. Michael R. Herman, 21, of Portland, is accused of loaning military uniforms for the East Germans to wear while getting through Checkpoint Charlie.

East German police do not check men in uniform. Army officials said this incident endangers the immunity.

Herman told a Portland newspaper by telephone Tuesday: "I thought I was helping other human beings find freedom."

He spoke from the Army stockade, where Spc. 4 William G. Taylor, Hermitage, Tenn., also is being held, accused of taking part in the incident.

"I didn't know the people personally. I was never actually in contact with them. Someone else was," said Herman.

Police said three West Berlin men also have been arrested in the case. They said this is what happened:

The Army men provided uniforms for two men. One of the West Berlin men went into East Berlin with an Austrian passport. He took in the uniforms. U.S. license plates were put on his car for the trip out. Two male refugees wore Army uniforms and two women hid in the car.

Once past the East Berlin checkpoint, the car raced past the West Berlin checkpoint and escaped from a U.S. Military Police car that gave chase.

The escape occurred Dec. 19.

Herman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Rudolph J. Herman, Portland. He enlisted in 1963 after graduation from high school and a term at Portland State College.

He served 13 months in Korea, then applied for duty in Germany, where he has been nine months.

He said he had been thinking of a career in the Army, "but I'm not so sure now."

School Refuses To Admit Iraqi

KLAMATH FALLS (UPI) — Winston Purvine, president of Oregon Technical Institute, Monday formally denied Iraqi student Omar Al-Nawam admittance to OTI, citing the student's "disruptive tendencies."

Al-Nawam has been conducting a running battle with the OTI administration over alleged discrimination by the school in requiring him to live on campus. He took his case to state officials but last week Warne Nunn, Gov. Mark Hatfield's administrative assistant, announced the governor's office would conduct no further investigation.

Al-Nawam Friday sought readmittance to school, but was informally denied admittance.

Monday Purvine issued this statement:

"My decision was between two alternatives: Re-admitting Mr. Al-Nawam who demonstrated disruptive tendencies while an active student in 1964 and 1965 and denying re-admission to insure that classes affected would proceed normally."

"My statement is made only because the ex-student released information about his personal relationship and defiance of rules as public information."
