

Berliner Fired, Rehired, After Student Protests

Editor's Note: This is the second in a three-part series concerning student protests at the Free University of Berlin.

For taking part in the student protest activities at the Free University of Berlin last spring and summer, one assistant in the political science faculty came close to losing his position and thus his chance to attain teaching status. (An assistant is usually a student doing post-doctoral work in order to gain teaching and later professional status).

Ekkehart Krippendorf wrote an article in a liberal West Berlin newspaper dealing with events that had caused the outbreak of student demonstrations at the Free University.

He erroneously reported that the philosopher Karl Jaspers had not been permitted to speak at the university because his political views on German unity did not conform to the rector's. (German equivalent of university president.)

Damage Done

A few days later Krippendorf corrected himself in the same newspaper, but the damage was already done. The rector considered Krippendorf's remarks slander and refused to renew his contract which expired in September.

Both student leaders and professors opposed the rector's decision. However, the rector declared that a question of personnel had nothing to do with students and stood firm.

As a result there were additional protest meetings for Krippendorf and petitions were circulated in his behalf, primarily in the political science institute.

Making Rash Demands

As is often the case even at American universities, the students became so wrapped up in their demonstrations that they were soon making rather rash demands; for example, that the university's highest administrative body be composed equally of

professors, assistants and students. Thus, the rector found it easy to stand by his stubborn position.

Finally a compromise solution was found, by which Krippendorf could retain his position, but not as an employee of the university. It was arranged for him to receive a scholarship.

Yet even this compromise would not have been reached, had not a number of professors sided with Krippendorf and protested the actions of the rector and the faculty senate.

There was much disunity among the faculty during these disturbances at the Free University. Professors called one another liars, accused each other in public letters of acting undemocratically and of presenting unscientific theses.

Two prominent professors in the political science department, who had supported the founding

Volunteer teachers are needed to assist in physical education and swimming classes for mentally retarded and physically handicapped children.

Academic credit in certain major fields may be earned by volunteers working on these programs. Transportation is provided.
