

To Young Democrats

Fadeley Reviews Lobbyist Initiative

"If the people own the government, they have a right to know where the influence is," state senator Edward Fadeley (D-Lane) told a meeting of the University Young Democrats Thursday night.

Fadeley, a former student editor of the University Law Review, said he hoped to have an initiative on the November ballot to require lobbyists to register themselves, their employers, how much they spend, and on whom.

"In Oregon, in an easy session, I think lobbyists spend \$300,000 and, in a hard session, a half-million dollars.

"The Legislature doesn't think much of disclosing paid lobbyists," Fadeley said. "When (the legislature) can't get something done, we have to have an initiative or let it go by the board," he continued. "If it is placed on the ballot, it will pass."

Fadeley's proposal provides for misdemeanor penalties for lobbyists who fail to register.

YD President Bill Muir indicated that his group plans to help Fadeley get the needed signa-

tures to put the initiative on the ballot.

"We will be quite active this term," Muir said, noting that the group had launched a petition drive to lower the voting age to 18 years. Fadeley also favors lowering the voting age.

When asked whom he expected as the Democratic Party's gubernatorial nominee, Fadeley said, "I don't see any serious candidate against Secretary of the Treasury Robert Straub right now."

Plans were also announced for a special showing of "A Thousand Days: A Tribute to John F. Kennedy" on Jan. 26.

The next meeting of the YD's will be a luncheon for Howard Morgan, a possible candidate for U.S. Senator.

Infirmary Services Expand As Location Switched

The University's brand new infirmary is finally in operation.

The staff of the University Health Service made the actual move at the beginning of the first week of winter term.

In doing so, they gained a lot of breathing room. The new building contains 37,000 square feet of floor space, a considerable jump from the 18,000 square feet in the old building.

Structure Praised

Dr. Avard Long, who joined the infirmary staff this fall, praised the new structure. "It's marvellous. I didn't think it would be this nice. We can see more patients more easily. For its purpose, you couldn't beat it," Long, a veteran of 13 years of private practice, said he feels that the center compares very favorably with the most modern hospitals.

The new \$1,100,000 structure, designed by Balzhiser, Seder and Rhodes of Eugene to accommodate a student body of 18,000, is equipped with 46 beds in the hospital area. In addition, there are four isolation rooms and a minor surgery area on each of the two floors. Two emergency entrances in the building's first floor provide space for ambulance service.

Added Equipment

Within the generous confines of the building is new equipment which will aid substantially in handling the massive case loads taken on by the center (200 to 300 during peak hours).

Examination and medicine charges made to students are now being processed electronically on an IBM system.

Communication within the complex is now performed with the aid of a pneumatic tube system, centralized in the main office.

One new X-Ray machine has been purchased, to be used along with the older machine in examinations. The new unit, although slightly smaller than the old one, is equipped with such modern features as centering controls, distance indicator, and adjustable beam and focal spot, all instrumental in doing faster work. An automatic print processor has cut development time from more than an hour to ten minutes.

Physical Therapy

The Physical Therapy area, located in the basement of the new building, contains two body whirl-

pools, two lower leg and ankle whirlpools, and two arm whirlpools. The treatment section will, when equipped, take four patients at a time, for hot pack, infra-red, ultra-sound, or electrical stimulation treatments. According to Larry Sandifer, the center's new registered physical therapist, equipment for these services should arrive in approximately three weeks.

A spring-mounted exercise floor is included in the therapy area, and a complete set of weights will be obtained, for use in treatment of muscular injuries.

According to Sandifer, the equipment was installed with expectations of aiding the University's athletic department and intramural programs.

Staff Expanded

The staff has been expanded to meet the needs of a growing number of students. There are 8 full-time doctors at the center now, and three new full-time nurses have been hired this year. Others recently added to the staff are a full-time pharmacist, a part-time psychiatrist, and a part-time roentgenologist. And there are plans to add more specialists later, including a dermatologist and an orthopedic surgeon.

The supply area is twice as great as in the old building.

(Things had been a bit crowded, with an atom-smasher in the basement.) And a staff library is being started in the new center, to hold technical literature needed by the staff.

Landscaping, being done by Lloyd Bond of Eugene, will include flowering cherry trees along each side of the sidewalk on 13th street as well as lawns and shrubs on each side of the building. The trees will be planted in the circular and rectangular beds along the walk.
