

Report Airs Money, Building Issues

A variety of current campus issues were discussed Tuesday night by University President Arthur S. Flemming, responding to questions by a panel consisting of Tom Clark, ASUO vice-president; Chuck Beggs, Emerald editor; and Pam Bladine, a member of the Student Conduct Committee.

The discussion, entitled "The President's Report," was aired on Private Line 3 at 7 p.m.

Flemming began the report by explaining the academic advising program that has been set up at the University. He also commented on the program of providing additional help to those who need it in selecting a vocation.

"During this term, a personal communication will be sent to those 3,000 students who have indicated an interest in such help," Flemming said. "We are always interested in the individual student, and hope this program will help to show that interest."

Stadium Discussed

Clark brought up the stadium issue. He asked if students would be charged in addition to their athletic fee now paid through student body funds to help finance the proposed new stadium.

Flemming stated that no definite decisions had been made up to this time about how to finance the remainder of the stadium. A cost estimate is being obtained, but a rough estimate

at this time for the cost of the proposed stadium is \$2,225,000.

Friends and alumni will hopefully contribute \$1 million, \$800,000 can be taken from the reserve athletic fund, and the remaining \$425,000 must be obtained in some manner, he said, perhaps through borrowing. But he stressed that no decision had been made as to how to raise the money.

Complete Discussion

"I want to assure you that no permanent decision will be made concerning this issue until I have personally carried on a full and complete discussion with your student representatives," Flemming emphasized.

Miss Bladine raised the question of closing hours that has been under the consideration of the Conduct Committee.

Flemming's reply was that a meeting would be held with the University Moms and Dads clubs after winter term, and that a decision would be made then.

Beggs pointed out that in addition to the Texas firm that has announced the building of a pri-

vate dormitory on campus, another firm is thinking of building a similar unit. His question was if these plans would affect the University's construction schemes.

Would be Approved

Flemming stated that the University would have nothing to do with the operation of these private dormitories, but that they would be on the approved housing list. Flemming has not received any information concerning the second company's plans.

"These private plans will have some effect on our long range plans," he said, "but we still hope for a low-cost housing project on the co-operative basis." These plans are to be discussed at the meeting of the State Board of Higher Education next week. Flemming reported that he was impressed with the attractiveness of the new private dormitory.

Clark asked if out-of-state tuition would be raised to help with the financing of higher education. Flemming stated that no decisions had been made yet, but that \$300,000 was needed for the coming year.

Maybe No Tuition Hike

"I feel that tuition will not be increased, but again this decision will be made at the State Board's meeting next week," he said. One

possibility would be a charge for applications, he observed.

Miss Bladine asked if a decision had been made to use the Ballroom in the SU for a study area to help alleviate the crowded conditions in the Fishbowl and the Bottom-of-the-Bowl.

"My reaction is very favorable," Flemming commented. "That is an area that is hardly ever used during the day, and I think it's a very good idea."

Flemming offered further comments on general improvements to be made at the University. Bids will be asked soon for a major addition at \$4.5 million to the science complex. Another major addition of \$2 million is being planned for Prince Lucien Campbell Hall.

A new building is being planned to house a \$750,000 IBM computer that is arriving soon. A human research development building is also being planned for the Veterans Dormitory area. A new administration building is being planned for the area on Agate Street across from the Walton dorm complex.

Beggs asked about further plans for married student housing. Flemming stated that it was not on the building priority list of the Board of Higher Education, but that perhaps more units would be possible. Flemming said that he was especially pleased with the Westmoreland project presently available for married students.

an amendment to that section which said no one could hold two offices simultaneously as well as run for them. It still didn't say anything about running for one office while holding another.

In any case, it didn't pass in the fall term elections because only 21 per cent of the students voted. One-fourth of the students must vote and two thirds of those must approve before the Constitution can be amended.

Last Year

The question came up last year when Larry Beathe, a delegate to the National Student Association Congress, won a senator-at-large position. A bill was introduced in the Senate asking him to withdraw from one position but he refused. It never reached the Constitution Committee be-

cause Beathe was forced to resign the NSA position for personal reasons.

Clark said there is a large number of people who had petitioned for the eight senator-at-large positions that are open but that students had shown only slight interest in the other offices.

Dull said SDS contacted him about appearing at the meeting but that he did not agree to participate.

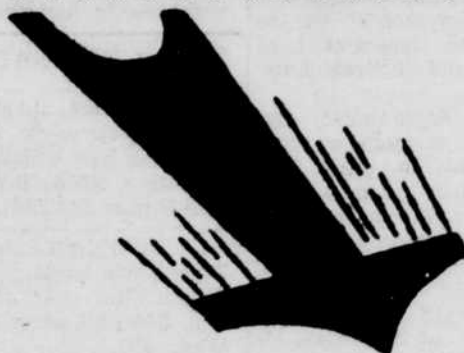
SDS said there was a mistake made when they scheduled the event and Dull's name was listed before he decided not to speak.
