

Educators, Students To Attend Conference

Music performers and lecturers from throughout the nation will be featured at the 15th annual Conference on Music Education Friday and Saturday at the University School of Music, which nearly 500 music educators and students are expected to attend.

The nationally known lecturers and demonstrators include James Pellerite, former principal flutist with the Philadelphia Orchestra who is considered among the most prominent flutists of our time.

Max F. Dalby, director of bands and head of the newly-created Department of Music at Utah State University, will lecture on band and wind instrument music.

Mary Tolbert, chairman of music education at Ohio State University's Center for School Experimentation, will demonstrate the approach to music in the elementary school. She has lectured and demonstrated at the Music Educators National Conference, of which she has been vice-president and president-elect.

Musical groups from throughout Oregon will perform during the conference. They include Portland's Grant High School Orchestra, Eugene's Sheldon High School Choir, the Corvallis High School Band, Warrenton High School Band, University of Oregon Symphonic Orchestra, and University Symphonic Band.

Robert Nye will be moderator of a Thursday evening pre-conference discussion on "Current Problems in Music Education."

The program has been divided into four sections: general music, choral, band-wind instrument, and orchestra-string instrument, with

lectures, demonstrations, and clinics scheduled for each section. Student groups will appear in demonstrations or special concerts for all four sections.

Another conference feature will be exhibits of national music companies, displayed throughout the conference.

The registration fee is \$3.50, and 50 cents for students. Registration begins at 8 a.m. Friday in the lobby of the School of Music auditorium. Persons interested in attending individual conference sessions may do so at a charge of 50 cents.

U Backs Seminar On Disturbed Child

What can be done to teach children who prove emotionally unable to learn in the usual public school classroom?

Every year 500,000 of these children enter public schools in the United States; over 11,500 children under 14 years of age in Oregon are classified "moderately disturbed."

Nearly 240 persons will attend a workshop at the University today and Friday which will feature two specialists on the problem of the "Troubled Child," theme of the workshop. They are Dr. George Donahue and Kent Durfee, M.D.

The workshop will also feature three panel discussions by University professors, teachers, administrators and psychologists.

tiousness or an "I-It" relationship. The final victory of "It-ness," Gumbiner said, is the destruction of mankind by atomic weapons. The final victory of "Thou-ness" is the coming of the Messiah," he continued.

Although some persons talk about the death of God, Buber talks instead, of an eclipse of God. The cause of this eclipse, according to Gumbiner, is the spiritual smog thrown up by civilization which is preoccupied with the "It-ness" of control.

In a question and answer period after his lecture, Rabbi Gumbiner was asked if man could maintain an "I-Thou" relationship with man but not with God. He said this was possible if there was an eclipse with God.

The two are actually related to each other, he continued. If man enters into a true "I-Thou" relationship with man he is, in essence, entering into a "one-ness" with God.

Small Community

The "I-Thou" relationship flourishes in a small community. One person asked if this were possible in the large bureaucratic environment of today.

Gumbiner said that although our political structure is on a large basis, there are all kinds of small community type relationships available to man. Some

of these include groups such as the family, churches, schools and neighborhood groups.

Buber, who was interested in all spheres of human activity, was concerned with the fact that man tries to hide away from the question of "where are you in your life?" Man tries to escape serious contemplation.

System of Hideouts

"Life is a system of hideouts," said Gumbiner. In the modern world, man has found ways to escape life. He can escape by turning on the radio or television. He tries to escape from having to sit down and hear the question that God asks.

Rabbi Gumbiner became interested in Martin Buber and his influence when the philosopher came to lecture at Yale. At that time many people came to listen.

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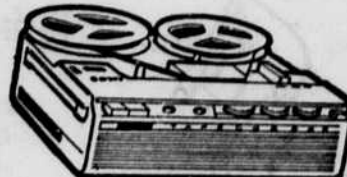
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
