

Folksinger Proposes Dynamics Experiment

Long range plans are being set by a Eugene group for an experiment in "group dynamics," an institute including retreats, conferences, and seminars.

Folksinger Marc Ellington, spokesman for the group, defined the institute as similar to Esaler Institute, founded by Aldous Huxley near Carmel, Calif.

Said Ellington, "I think a lot

of things that are happening in folk music and the arts can be handled by group dynamics. It kind of ties together all of these things."

The experiment in group dynamics, Ellington said, would take place during weekend retreats and seminars, ranging in topics from non-violence to hallucinatory drugs.

The seminars would be open to both University students and the public, with small fees charged to cover room and board expenses for the weekend.

Ellington hopes to import several speakers to the seminars to speak on education, philosophy, and arts. The group dynamics idea, a relatively new education experiment, is essentially small groups gathering "with the group being sensitive to each other," said Ellington.

Presently Ellington is giving mostly college concerts, and may appear at the University in the spring. He also may make an appearance at a movie Monday sponsored by the Students for a Democratic Society.

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not sent an ambassador directly to Hanoi.

"What indications do you have of Hanoi's willingness to negotiate?" Duncan asked Bartlett. Duncan confirmed the administration's sincerity in its peace overtures.

Bartlett asked Duncan if he realized that by his support of the administration that he was "indirectly responsible for sending Oregon boys to Viet Nam, and therefore indirectly responsible for the past, present, and future deaths of those who are killed?"

Duncan answered: "Do you believe that I am not aware of that

responsibility, and do you believe that President Johnson is not aware of that responsibility?"

Duncan was asked if it "bothered him that other politicians felt our position in Viet Nam is ridiculous." He replied that he "respected their opinions," and reminded the questioner that "this is a democracy, and people are going to think differently, and are going to express themselves."

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
