

Court Convicts Two Students for Cheating

Two students were found guilty of violations of the Student Conduct Code in a lengthy session of Student Court Thursday.

In a closed hearing a graduate transfer student was found guilty of furnishing false information to the University with the intent to deceive. (Section I.B. 2.b.) The student had pleaded innocent.

Last summer the student applied to live in a married students' housing project, and gave the name of an alleged wife. He

was allowed to live in Westmoreland, a University housing project for married students. Later it was discovered that the student's true status was single. The student is still single, but has plans to be married later this year.

The sanction imposed was an admonition and a warning.

In the other hearing, an open one, a freshman pleaded innocent to a charge of academic cheating. (Section I.B. 2.a.) He was found guilty and was put on disciplinary probation for the remainder of the present school year. He was also reminded that any other violations incurred while on disciplinary probation could lead to suspension.

Witness in the case was Bernd Crasemann, professor of physics. The cheating occurred on one of Crasemann's midterms last fall.

Due to overcrowded conditions, according to Crasemann, three different tests were made out to discourage cheating. The tests are referred to as X, Y, and Z. The questions were in different order, and the figures in the problem were slightly different. No two students with the same test

could sit next to each other.

The defendant had the Z exam. Two of his answers were the correct answers for the Y test. Although it would have been possible, Crasemann explained that the two answers in question might have been derived from mistakes in mathematical computation, it is highly unlikely that this was true in this instance.

Crasemann also observed that there was no computation shown on the exam for the two questions involved, but that the student had worked out the answers step by step for the other questions.

The defendant stated he hadn't known solutions for either question. He made a wild guess on one of the problems.

As for the other answer, he stated he'd overheard a student behind him telling the answers to that particular problem on all three exams. So he chose one of the answers he overheard and

wrote it down, hoping it was the correct one for his exam.

The question argued then, was if overhearing an answer and using it constitutes cheating. Defense maintained that it did not. There must be intent to cheat, or preparation for cheating, before the offense can properly be called cheating, said defense. Therefore, the defendant was not guilty of cheating. The offense was "too marginal" to be cheating, reiterated defense. Defense also requested that the members of the court remember Section IIA.

10.f., which states, "No member of the Court shall vote that the student has committed the offense . . . unless the evidence is clear and convincing . . ."

Prosecution replied if the defendant had asked for the answer and was caught, the grounds for prosecution would be not that the answer was asked for, but that it was taken and used. Therefore, taking and using information from another, as the defendant admitted he did, is enough to constitute cheating, concluded prosecution.

Photo Exhibit Set At Museum of Art
