National Center Slates Journalism Seminars

A newly-established "Washington Journalism Center" for graduate study and professional seminars at the nation's capitol has a number of links to the University's School of Journalism.

University President Arthur S. Flemming is one of the trustees of the new center, and faculty members of the School of Journalism were active participants in the planning and establishment of the Washington Center.

When in full operation the center will offer fellowships to graduate students, working newsmen, and journalism educators. The fellowships will range from \$2000 to \$12,500 and will provide an opportunity for study, research, or teaching at the center.

Graduate students awarded fellowships will spend one or two terms at the Center, which is located four blocks from the White House. They will participate in seminars, internships, research projects, and special conferences. The Center will not give academic credit or issue degrees, but work done at the center may earn credit at the student's home university, where he will return to complete his advanced degree program.

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Dean John L. Hulteng and Professor Warren C. Price of the University of Oregon School of Journalism were members of the committee of educators and journalists who planned the establishment of the center during the last two years. The acting director of the Center is Ray E. Hiebert, chairman of the Journalism Department at American University in Washington.

'Student Rights' Lauded In AAUP Statement

NEW YORK (CPS)—A firm stand for student rights has been issued by the American Association of University Professors.

Published in the winter issue of the AAUP Bulletin, the statement is the result of a four-year study and several revised drafts. It is the first formal statement by the AAUP on student rights.

The association has long been a powerful force in defining and obtaining academic freedom for faculty members.

The student sit-in movement for civil rights first prompted the AAUP to consider the question of student rights, both on and off campus. Headed by Prof. Phillip Monypenny of the University of Illinois, the new AAUP standing committee on the Faculty Responsibility for the Academic Freedom of Students studied the practices of the "better established and freer institutions" for the basis of its position.

"Faculty members and administration officials should insure that institutional powers are not employed to inhibit such intellectual and personal development of students as is often promoted by their off-campus activities," the statement says.

Along with placing a measure of responsibility on the faculty for safe-guarding student academic freedom, the statement says:

—Students are responsible for learning a course, "but they should be free to take reasoned exception to the data or views offered." They should maintain the standards established by their professors, but should be protected against prejudiced or capricious academic evaluation.

Information which a professor acquires about a student's views during the course of his work as an instructor should be confidential.

—Institutions should have a careful policy on maintaining and revealing a student's education record. Academic and disciplinary records should be separate; data from disciplinary and counseling records should not be available to unauthorized persons, and "no records should be kept which reflect the political activities or beliefs of students."

—Not only should institutions be open to all who are qualified, they should "use their influence to secure equal access for all students to public facilities in the local community." Campus organizations should be open to all, students and student organizations should be allowed to express opinion publicly and privately and they should be allowed to invite and hear any person they choose.

Speaking on off-campus freedom, the AAUP statement says, should have the same rights as any citizen. Institutional powers should not be used to "inhibit" the student in any way in his off-campus experiences.

The statement also sets standards for disciplinary proceedings and protections for student government and student publications. "Disciplinary proceedings should be instituted only for violation of standards of conduct defined in advance and published through such means as a student handbook or a generally available volume of university regulations."

AAUP officials said that some administrators were critical of a preliminary draft of the statement published in 1964 but that events since then made them more favorable to it.

Colombians Visit University YMCA

The ten visiting Colombian students will be guests at the YWCA International Coffee Hour at 4 p.m. Thursday in the Orides Lounge, Gerlinger Hall.

The ten students have been chosen for this visitation as potential leaders of their country. Selected from six different universities in Colombia, they are guests of the U.S. State Department on a special program by the National Social Welfare Assembly.

They will be touring Washington, D.C., Atlanta, Georgia; Los Angeles; Sioux City, Iowa; New York City, and Eugene.

The University is the only college campus they will visit. During their stay they will visit jails, a law school in Los Angeles, and Disneyland.

Viet Nam Bulletin Sold

The Student-Faculty Committee to Stop the War in Viet Nam will sell copies of Viet Nam, a bulletin, in the Student Union today.

The bulletin contains documents, letters, and poems from North Viet Nam and from the National Liberation Front of South Viet Nam.

The bulletin was prepared by a Student-Faculty sub-committee of editors.

Hans Burla Speaks
