Wood Conducts Teaching Seminar

A seminar in improving college teaching is being conducted by Hugh B. Wood, professor of education. Graduate students and faculty members are invited to attend one or more of the class meetings Wednesdays, 7-10 p.m. in room 104 Education.

Topics to be discussed for the remainder of the term include:

laboratory methods, Jan. 26; teaching by television, Feb. 3 (Thursday); case study methods, Feb. 9; project methods, Feb. 16; student evaluation, Feb. 23; use of audio-visual aids, March 2; and use of programmed material, March 9. Each seminar is led by a guest lecturer from the University or other Oregon institutions.

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has fulfilled its initial obligations to the limit and it wishes to move on to more extensive matters, it must establish its right—if not its obligation—to do so by precedent. The imminent ASUO senatorial elections afford that opportunity.

After the election if the majority of the candidates elected have received the ASUO's electoral consent to engage in partisan national and international issues, then the Senate's right to take stands on those issues will be substantiated by the ASUO. At present there is no such precedent.

The formation of political parties is characteristic of those at Harvard, Yale, or Berkeley would both catalyze and develop this precedent. As the two-party system facilitates the direction of policy in government, so would the formation of such organizations on campus do the same for the ASUO. Political parties would channel political policies into an efficient instrument of expression here at the University.

But these developments are for the future. And for the present there is the first step of a thousand-mile journey to increased political concern by the ASUO Senate. That first step is a referendum on the Viet Nam crisis and a precedent-setting election that will call the ASUO Senate to the realm of partisan national and international issues.
