

Italian Water Art Architect's Topic

A California landscape architect who has lectured at four Italian universities will discuss "Decorative Use of Water in Italy" at the University at 8 p.m. today in 106 Lawrence.

As a guest of the School of Architecture and Allied Arts' Department of Landscape and Urban Planning, Donald E. Crump will meet with students, attend a terminal review, and participate in a planning and housing seminar, in addition to giving his public lecture today.

Crump was graduated from the University in 1953, when he won the American Society of Landscape Architects' Merit Award for excellence in the study of landscape architecture. He is currently a doctoral candidate in botany.

In the question of whether the advisor to courts should help the ASUO President in making these appointments, Dean Nickerson said he would be "perfectly willing" to see the advisor make up a list after interviewing prospective candidates and send it to the student body president.

"Whoever has this job (assisting the president)," Nickerson warned, "will have to be someone who will be paid for it. Otherwise the job won't be done."

"The problem," he added, "is simply one of time." He pointed out that the person who did the interviewing last year spent over 60 hours on it.

Miss Livesay is a 1965 C.A.P. scholarship winner and was one of several Oregon cadets selected to attend missile orientation at Vandenberg Air Base, Calif., in August, 1965.
