

Shriver Scholar Program Set Up

The University Poverty Council will consider about 20 applications Friday for competition in the Sargent Shriver Scholars Program.

The scholarship program competition is open to "young Americans who have distinguished themselves by outstanding work in the War on Poverty," according to an Office of Economic Opportunity spokesman. Shriver is director of the OEO. He was in charge of the Peace Corps until last week.

Seven national winners will be chosen — one from each of the seven OEO geographical regions — "who best exemplify the spirit of self-help and community serv-

ice so energetically supported by Mr. Shriver both domestically and abroad," according to the OEO.

The University Poverty Council will pick one person to compete in the regional competition against entrants from Nevada, Montana, Idaho, Washington, Utah, California and Oregon.

DeBerry Organizer

Clyde DeBerry, who has organized the recruiting of applicants at the University, said that applications have been given to four University-related OEO organizations: the Work-Study Pro-

gram; VISTA; Upward Bound; and the Tongue Point Job Center.

"It would be conceivable that people who work in Saul Alinsky's community action program or people who are civil rights workers, would also be eligible," DeBerry said. He said that Migrant Labor workers and others might also be considered.

However, DeBerry noted that all applicants must meet certain standards. The joint selection board, representing the OEO and the Experiment in International Living, will meet in March to consider nominees between the ages of 18 and 30, who come from disadvantaged backgrounds, and have the ability and maturity to benefit from the experience. DeBerry also said applicants must be unpaid for their work.

To Foreign Countries

The seven winners will go to different foreign countries for two months this summer, where they will live with families and participate in the activities of Peace Corps volunteers wherever possible.

Persons interested in the pro-

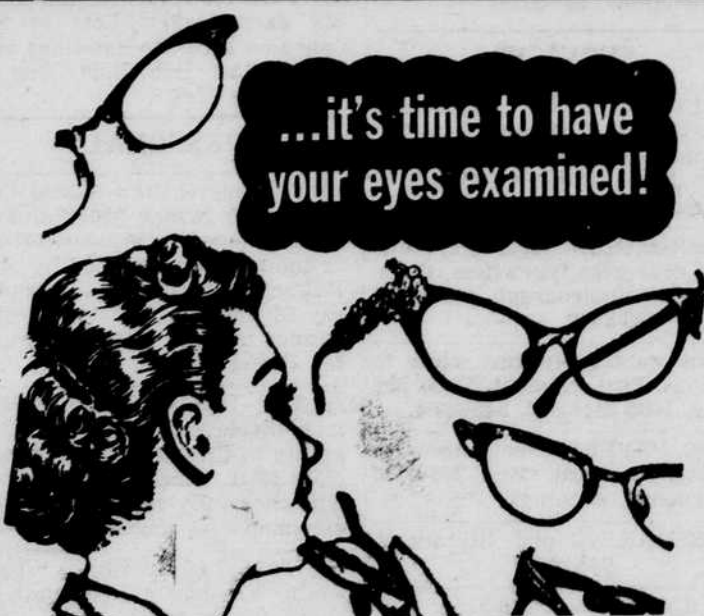
