Church to Sponsor New Men's Co-op

"Aldersgate" is the name of a new co-operative which will begin housing University men next fall.

The First Evangelical United Brethren Church is starting the new co-op which has a capacity of 25 occupants. It is located at 1810 Alder.

Aldersgate is open to all University men regardless of religious affiliation. The Rev. Max Mor-

gan of the First EUB Church, said they "would welcome freshmen," but the arrangement will be in accordance with other University co-ops. Freshmen students are allowed to live in co-ops if they testify that they can't meet the financial burden of the University housing.

A constitution is being worked on now. It will be similar to those of other co-ops. In the fall, students will be allowed to make changes and recommendations, Morgan said. He said he would rather the students have a part in the formulation of the constitution, but a constitution must be drawn up now. The students will be given the right to make some of their own rules in the fall.

Certain restrictions will be imposed on the residents of the co-op. No smoking, drinking, or card playing will be allowed. The policy regarding card playing is like that of Ann Judson House, another co-op. The policy will eliminate the possibility of gambling, stated Morgan.

The name Aldersgate was chosen for two reasons. One is related to the fact that the house is on Alder St. The other is in regards to an incident which took place involving John Wesley. The Evangelical United Brethren Church has its roots, theologically speaking, in the Wesleyan movement, said Morgan. Wesley had a deep religious experience at a meeting on Aldersgate Street. This is the second reason for the name of the new co-op.

Medical Service Offers Program

Capt. Sue Ozburn, Army Medical Specialist Corps Personnel Counselor for the sixth U. S. Army, will be at the University Monday to interview college students and graduates and acquaint them with educational and financial opportunities offered by the Army Medical Service.

AMS offers financial assistance through educational programs in occupational therapy, physical therapy, and dietetics.

A one-year approved physical therapy course is offered for women who have a baccalaureate degree with the necessary prerequisites, as well as dietetic internship and an occupational therapy affiliation.

Applicants for the programs are appointed second lieutenants and receive pay and allowances of that rank during their training.

Undergraduates majoring in dietetics or occupational therapy who have completed their sophomore year, may apply for financial aid of more than \$230 a month through participation in the Army student dietician and occupational therapist programs. Upon graduation they become second lieutenants and receive an additional year of training at one of the Army's large teaching hospitals.

Stadium Campaign Gains Momentum

EUGENE (AP)—A campaign to raise \$1 million in public contributions for the new University football stadium passed the two-thirds mark Thursday.

A total of \$668,000 in money and signed pledges has been collected, reported Lynn McCready, Eugene, general chairman of the campaign.

He said about \$168,000 of the total has been collected since the first week in January.

The stadium, planned to have between 40,000 and 46,000 seats, will be built at a cost of about \$2.25 million in Eugene's North Bank Park.
