Glenn Wins, 9-4

Captain Bruce Glenn, obviously tired after missing practice for three weeks due to a knee injury, decided Mike Walker 9-4 in 177 for the final Oregon victory. Oregon State, which now owns an 8-3 season dual meet record, has lost only to Colorado, Wyoming and Brigham Young—three schools they encountered on a recent road trip through the tough Rocky Mountain country.

The tie on the Ducks' record came Friday night in a meet with Portland State at Portland.

The freshman swimming team did not really expect to win any of its two meets over the weekend.

The opposition was just too tough.

So tough, in fact, that the Ducklings could have equalled a freshman record in every event and still have lost both meets.

"We were killed," grinned Oregon coach Don Van Rossen.

Wilson High School of Tacoma, Washington, got its turn with the Ducklings first on Friday afternoon.

The Frosh could manage only two wins in 11 events and the perennial Washington state prep champs swamped them, 65-30.

Schwandt Wins

Wayne Schwandt, who put together an overwhelming victory in the diving competition, was Oregon's only individual winner. The other triumph came with the frosh's 400-yard freestyle relay effort of 2:37.2, provided by the team of Mike Dowling, George Frekany, Steve Bond and Don Peterson.

The following day was even rougher. The "best University of Washington frosh team ever" trounced the Ducklings 74-21.

Once again, the Ducklings could manage only two wins. And once again, one of those wins was provided by Schwandt. Wayne compiled 191.45 points to make the diving win easily.

The other victory — Steve Bond's 5:20.8 win in the 500-yard freestyle event — was a frosh record, bettering by a second the record Bond set earlier in the year.

"Those freshmen (Washington's) are really fantastic," observed Van Rossen. "They clobbered the Washington varsity. . . I don't know, maybe our varsity would lose, too."

Oregon beat the defending national small college champion Vikings 19-14 the week before at Eugene, but spotted Portland State too many points in the lower weights, and could only tie, 16-16, this time around.

The Ducks almost pulled off the win. Trailing 13-2 at the end of four matches, Oregon rallied to win four of the next five matches, including a pin by Bob Mitchell in 167.

Glenn, Lawrence Win

The key to the meet was in the 177 class and unlimited weight classes where Bruce Glenn and Bob Lawrence won by respective scores of 19-3 and 20-7. More than just a few times, Glenn and Lawrence had their opponents perilously close to pins.

But a pin was never called, and any hopes for a team victory disappeared.

The only Portland State fall was registered by Rick Sanders—a 123-lb. all-American who won every national tournament he entered last year in addition to competing in the world wrestling championships. His victim, for the third time this season, was Oregon's Grant Henjyoji.

The Ducks did not expect to lose in 130—but they did. Rich Greene handed Curt Scott his first defeat of the dual meet season, 8-2.

Oregon ended the game with a 408 percentage, while Portland shot only 319. The Pilots got balanced scoring as Gloden led the Pilots with 15, and was followed by Maerz with 14, Perry 12, and Ed Clark with 10. Perry also pulled down 12 rebounds, while Maerz managed 9.

Clark, who scored 24 the night before, ran into foul trouble in the first half and had to sit out some of the game.

"When Clark got in foul trouble, it hurt us," Etzel said. "He can carry our offense."

Belko reported that Bill Thomas injured a weak ankle during the first half, and Bill Jennings had a bad cold during the game and was unable to play for very long.
