Seven Students In Beauty Pageant

Home Economist To Speak About Work in Viet Nam

A home economist who served with the International Voluntary Services for two years as an adviser to extension agents in Viet Nam will speak to the campus 4-H Club at 7 p.m. today in the SU.

Gloria Johnson, now the assistant state 4-H extension agent, served from 1963 to April 1965 as an adviser to home improvement agents with the Vietnamese Agricultural Extension Service. She lived with her interpreter, Lily, in Ban-Me-Thuot, a town in the central highlands.

"We worked with Montagnard (mountain) tribesmen... I drove an old military jeep and took my interpreter and home agents to villages where we gave demonstrations to these tribespeople."

She spent nearly a year in the highlands, and then moved to the Delta in the Sledgie hamlet as a part of a pacification program. Miss Johnson helped people to build stores, washing areas, pig styes, and wells.

The final seven months were spent in administration in Saigon, making payrolls, hiring local workers, etc., for IVS.

She is a native Oregonian, who received her degree in home economics from OSU in 1958. From there she went to Idaho as a home demonstration agent and later as the assistant state 4-H Club leader.

Miss Johnson will also show slides from her stay in Viet Nam at tonight's meeting. The public is invited.

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Scholar to Discuss Dalai Lama Visit

A recent audience with His Holiness, the Dalai Lama, will be the topic of a Browning Room lecture by Terrell V. Wylie, professor of Tibetan languages at the University of Washington's Far Eastern and Russian Institute on Wednesday.

Wylie is a noted Tibetan scholar who recently held his third audience with the Dalai Lama. His lecture will be at 7:30 p.m.

Wylie brought to Seattle a group of Tibetan refugees, many of whom enrolled in the University of Washington and is the author of a number of articles for scholarly journals.

Discussion leader will be Thomas O. Ballinger, head of the Department of Art Education at the University, who has been assisting Wylie with an article on the geography of Nepal. Ballinger lived in Nepal from 1956 to 1958. The public is invited to attend the lecture.

The Friday evening world premier of "One World at a Time" must be considered a tremendous success for writer Richard F. Stockton, and the University Theater.

"One World at a Time" portrays the life of Robert Ingersoll, an important 19th century agnostic. Ingersoll was torn between his strong religious convictions and the conflicts resulting from his need to express these convictions. He lived in a period when religion played an important part in the lives of everyone, a period when heretics were not to be tolerated.

Embittered Ingersoll

Ingersoll saw his views injure his minister father, affect his law practice, and finally ruin his chances for the governorship of Illinois. Embittered, he spoke out with increasing vigor and witnessed the political ruin of his brother and the mental anguish of his beloved wife.

Stockton has not only created a powerful drama, but also a humorous, extremely entertaining contribution to the contemporary theatre: "Have a cigar, Judge."

Farley Exceptional

Donald Farley, a Ph.D. candidate in English and instructor of composition and literature at the University, did an exceptionally outstanding job in portraying Ingersoll. Never has this writer witnessed an actor develop a character with the depth and skill that Farley displayed.

Farley was ably supported by Beverly Waldo, who portrayed Eva, Robert Ingersoll's wife; Robert Waldo who played Ebon Ingersoll, his brother; and Alexander Duncan who portrayed the Rev. John Ingersoll, his father. The sets, makeup, and costumes were also excellent and should be commended.

"One World at a Time" will continue to run through Saturday, and should be included in the entertainment plans of everyone.

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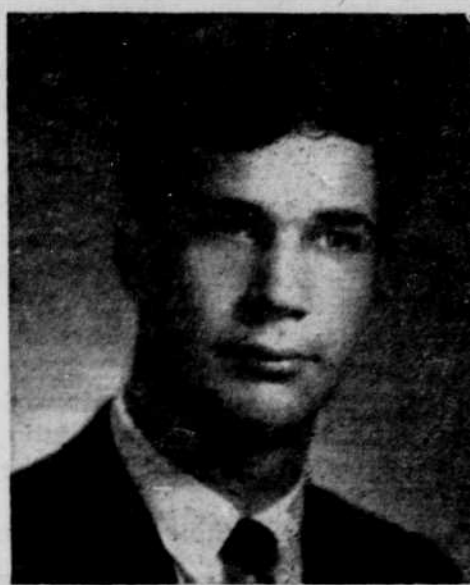
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
