

US Policy Called Wrong by Four

The Faculty-Student Committee to Stop the War in Viet Nam met last Wednesday in Fenton Hall to discuss present administration policy in Southeast Asia.

Four speakers, two students and two faculty members, each gave five-minute speeches before an audience of about thirty students. The speeches were followed by a question-and-answer period during which the speakers' views were elaborated.

University Offers Library Institute

The University's second Institute in Librarianship will be held during the University's 1966 summer session June 20-Aug. 12.

The institute, "The Librarian and Contemporary Educational Changes," will be financed by a National Defense Education Act grant of \$78,774.

During the eight-week session seminars will be conducted in changes in modern educational philosophy, contemporary trends in school planning and instruction, new approaches in subject areas, and the role of the librarian in relation to these trends.

The NDEA grant will provide stipends of \$75 a week for 50 participants. In order to qualify, applicants must have completed 18 quarter hours or more in librarianship and currently be employed as a librarian.

The first speaker, Jerry Simpson, a student, emphasized the need to build a stronger peace movement. He said that it is not enough to merely be for peace, but one must also be opposed to present U.S. policy. He described the "Great Society" as a welfare state designed to buy off dissent.

George Streisinger, professor of biology, viewed U.S. policy as an effort to block communist expansion rather than an honest effort to build representative governments. He advocated free elections for the Vietnamese people, removal of U.S. forces from Viet Nam, and allowing a representative government including the Viet Cong.

Hal Gibbon, a student, defended the right of free dissent. He stated, however, that peace movements need consensus to provide a unified front.

David Aberle, professor of anthropology, accused the U.S. of being in Viet Nam illegally, unilaterally, and of causing unjustified suffering. He said that the U.S. military action violated the U.N. charter, the Geneva agreements, the Constitution, and supported the French prior to 1954. He stated that U.S. policy is aimed at world domination, not freedom. He concluded by saying that the only good policy would be for the U.S. to withdraw from Viet Nam and leave any settlement to the Vietnamese.

The rest of the meeting was given to questions from the audience.

Col. Embert A. Fossum, professor of Military Science at the University, cited Mrs. Crawford's performance as "contributing significantly to the successful operation of the ROTC department."

Pollution Series To Be Offered

The first in a series of programs entitled "Pollution and You" will be presented at the University at 7:30 p.m. today in 150 Science.

Two air pollution experts will speak at the first pollution program.

The local approach to air pollution control will be discussed by Leslie Hood, education specialist for the San Francisco Bay Area Air Pollution Control District.

Speaking on federal pollution control programs will be Donald Keagy, director of the Western Region of the Health, Education and Welfare's Division on Air Pollution. A question and answer period will follow the speeches.

There are two exhibits, illustrating pollution and its affects, now on display in the Student Union. One exhibit is a comparison of the lungs of a person living in a relatively clean atmosphere with the lungs of a person living in an industrial area. The other is a photographic display of pollution in Eugene. Both exhibits will remain in the SU through Sunday.

The program is sponsored by the SU Board.

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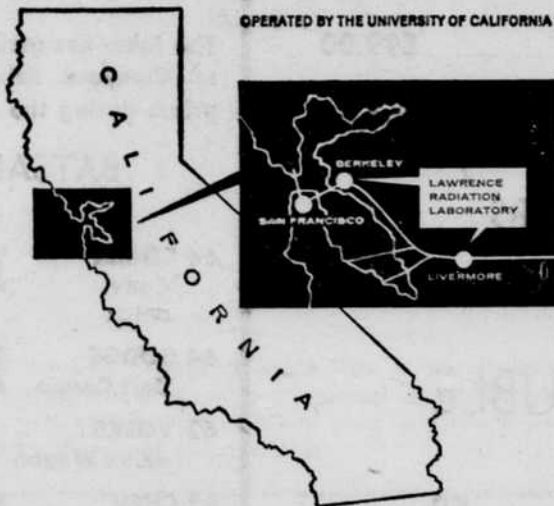
