

Board Approves SDS Request

Student Union Board members approved a request by Students for a Democratic Society to co-sponsor the appearance on campus of a professional repertory theatrical group.

The show to be presented by the San Francisco Mime Group, "Civil Rights in the Cracker Barrel" is a take-off on old time minstrel shows.

Mike Harpster, president of SDS, attended the Board meeting to make the request. He said the show was both controversial and stimulating.

The Honors College has said they would put up part of the money to have the group come to

talk to the Honors College Colloquium on the theatre.

The Mime Group would perform April 9 in the SU Ballroom. Some Board members raised doubts that enough people would come since the Glenn Yarbrough concert is scheduled for the preceding night. Harpster said a different kind of people would be attracted to the repertory group so there shouldn't be any real conflict.

One board member said that by bringing in this group, there would be some diversification in the type of special attractions brought to the University. In the past, he said, they have all been about the same.

In other action, the Board approved a proposal to allow the use of a public address system at the Free Speech program.

It was decided that the TV room in the SU can no longer be scheduled for use of meetings of special groups, including the Armed Services, since the room is technically a public area.

The Recreation Council has decided not to have the water ski tournament this spring. It is planned for early next fall.

In its final action, the Board voted to go ahead with plans to try to book a performance by Harry Belafonte at the University next fall term.
