

Bean Fire Alarm Goes Berserk

Burning newspaper around a heat sensing device sent off a fire alarm in the Bean Complex at 3:50 a.m. Sunday. Head resident Ken Berry discovered in the damaged thermostat in the basement while searching for the alarm which had been pulled so that it could be turned off.

About 4:15 a.m. Berry told Jane DePriest, Willcox counselor: "It'll be on for awhile. Someone put newspaper in the thermostat and lit it. Then it burned through and shorted in the fire alarm. We will have to call an electrician to get it turned off."

Most of the women residents were in the lounge or lobby trying to escape the incessant noise. Some went back to bed with pillows over their heads while others sat in their rooms playing radio or record players for "distraction."

Several men wandered about the quad waiting for the alarm to be turned off.

Finally at 4:35 a.m. a physical plant electrician disconnected the wires, the noise stopped, and the residences went back to sleep, a few minutes after they were first awakened.

The fire was "maliciously set" according to Mrs. Nancy Berry, Bean head resident. The complete damage and cost will not be known until later this week, she said.
