ed closeness of the contest to the Vikings' "good condition and hustle. Also, our injuries played an important part." The Ducks were playing minus the services of backs Dave Bottemiller and Ken Le Doux and forwards Peter Maud, Dave Docherty, and Jack Haring.

The coach added that "the defense in the backs in the second half seemed to completely disappear," as the Vikings kept constant pressure on the Ducks throughout the period.

In a preliminary game, the second teams of Oregon and Oregon State battled to a scoreless tie. "Oregon had better backs," said Howe, "but OSU was much bigger in the forwards. We were unlucky not to score on two or three occasions."

The coach felt that "back John Taylor had a very good game, as did forward Gary Curry." In a previous game this season, OSU came away with a 6-3 victory, so Howe was more than satisfied with the team's performance.

The varsity's next conference game is on Feb. 19 against OSU at Corvallis, a game which may determine the conference championship. The Beavers have a 1-0-1 record in league play, good for second place.

Next Saturday, Oregon will oppose the Vancouver Trojans on the football practice field at 2:30 p.m.

A distinguished American volcanologist and field geologist, Aaron C. Waters of the University of California will be in Oregon during February to give the 1966 Condon Lecture series.
