NSA Sponsors Meeting On Community Involvement

A National Student Association-sponsored conference on "community involvement" will be held Saturday and Sunday in the Student Union.

The purpose of the conference is to discuss projects which involve not only students, but the whole community.

University students may attend any of the sessions for free. A \$1 registration fee will get them a transcript of the sessions, a packet, a badge, and a dinner, but students who want to go to the dinner must register Saturday morning.

The highlight of the conference will be two speeches beginning at 4 p.m. Saturday. Rick Stearns, from Stanford University and a member of the NSA National Supervisory Board, will discuss the successful student discount program he has initiated in the San Francisco area.

This program of merchandise discounts has failed at many of the campuses where it has been tried.

At the same time, Walt Senterfitt, director of the Community Involvement Desk at the NSA office in Washington, D.C., will speak on community involvement.

Registration will take place from 8-11:30 p.m. today and 8-15:9 a.m. Saturday.

Open House to Show Electron Accelerator

The public may view the University's new electron accelerator during an open house from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday in the basement of the former Health Service building.

The Van De Graaff accelerator and auxiliary equipment at the University were purchased by a \$300,000 grant from the Atomic Energy Commission and are being used for research of nuclear structure. It was installed last spring and will begin operating at full power in late February.

The machine is capable of accelerating atomic particles to speeds of about one-tenth the speed of light.

It is one of the few in the world that provides an exceptionally high quality beam of accelerated particles which come out of the machine in very short bursts of time, such as one-billionth of a second.

The open house in conjunction with the 1966 Northwest Electrical Exposition at the Lane County Fair grounds. The physics department will have a booth display at the Exposition to show photographs of the accelerator. Also on display at the booth will be the University's gamma ray detector, a small, very high precision instrument which can detect the emission of gamma rays with more accuracy than any other method. The detector is used in conjunction with research conducted through the accelerator and was purchased as a part of the AEC grant.

The booth has been arranged by David K. McDaniels, assistant professor of physics, and will be staffed by members of the physics department.
