

Hoop Team Wins Two PAC Tilts

Oregon moved up in PAC standings and remained a dark horse for the PAC title as they downed California Saturday night, 68-51 in McArthur Court.

After a shaky first half, the Ducks came back in the second half and held Cal's shuffling offense to 22 points, while they scored 43.

Cal moved to a 20-12 lead on

the shooting of Charlie Perkins, who hit 13 of his 16 points in the first half. Breaking loose for quick layins, and potting long jumpers, Perkins led Cal to a quick lead midway through the first period.

But Dave Kafoury supplied two jumpers from outside, and John Pinkstaff sank three foul shots and a fielder as the Ducks pulled to within four of the Bears at halftime, 29-25.

2nd Half Different

The second half was a different story. The Ducks pulled even within two minutes, and then exploded with a nine-point outburst while Cal was only getting layins from Perkins and Russ Critchfield. Jim Barnett, Nick Jones, Kafoury and Pinkstaff shared the scoring duties during the seige on the Cal basket.

Fine passing by Jones and Barnett, plus a ball hawking defense, caused the Ducks to catch fire

and pull away from the harried Bears.

Barnett led the Ducks in scoring as he picked up 16 and pulled within two points of second place Dick Wilkins in all-time career scoring for Oregon.

Jones and Pinkstaff scored 14 apiece, and Kafoury added 12. Perkins led Cal with 16, and was followed by Critchfield who scored 11.

Cal Cools Off

Cal hit a hot .500 from the field in the first half, but cooled to only .212 in the second half when the Ducks applied more defensive pressure. Oregon shot .414 for the game, hitting 24 of 58 shots from the field.

Duck coach Steve Belko, who celebrates his birthday Monday, was pleased with the second half of Saturday's game, but thought the Ducks were a "little flat" in the first half.

"We hurried our shots a little in the first half, but the defense stayed in there and took care of our shooting," Belko remarked. Oregon shot .355 in the first period.

"Shuffle Offense"

"I thought Kafoury did a fine job guarding Critchfield," Belko said. "He did a good job on him down at California, too. He's more tenacious than some of the other boys."

"California runs a 'shuffle of-

fense' and a lot of coaches throw up their hands and go into a zone defense when they play against this type offense," Belko said. "It's a lot like the Air Force offense with a few variations." Air Force ruined Duck defenses in the Far West Classic with a similar offense.

Belko, who was running a temperature of 101 degrees during the game, said he didn't think the team "let down" any after the Stanford game. "They're all important now," Belko replied.

The Ducks have now won their last nine home games. They were beaten in the first game at McArthur Court by Idaho, and have won all home games since.

UO Matmen Blank California

The Oregon wrestling team increased its record to 9-3-1 Friday in McArthur Court with a 35-0 blanking of a visiting California squad.

The Bears, giving up one weight class by forfeit and another by default, lost two falls and five decisions to the Ducks.

Oregon's Grant Henjyoji scored the Ducks' first decision, a 7-2 win over Barry Masuda in the 123-pound weight class, and put the Webfoots ahead for good.

Doug Robertson picked up his 11th win of the season, pinning Cal's Stuart Crymes at 2:59 in the 130 class.

After a forfeit at 137 to Oregon's Curt Scott, the Bears dropped behind by a 16-0 count when Kim Oller lost a 10-3 decision to Oregon's Steffen Criner at 145. Criner increased his sea-

son's record to 8-5 with the win. Craig Caster gained the most lop-sided decision of the meet in the 152-pound division as he bested Cal's Alan Seigel, 21-8. The loss was Seigel's second in ten starts.

Caster led 5-2 after the first round, 11-4 at the end of the second, and added ten points in the final three minutes for the victory. His scoring came on two near falls, two predicaments, three reversals and a takedown.

John Malpass picked up his fifth victory for the Ducks with a 6-2 win over Don Schlotz. Although the match was knotted at 2-2 after two rounds, Malpass gained the advantage with a reversal ten seconds into the final stanza and, with two riding time points, gained the win and pushed Oregon into a 22-0 lead.

Cal's Bernie Vancil began his 167-pound bout with Oregon's Bob Mitchell but, after an apparent leg injury in the first round, defaulted half way into the second round. Mitchell was leading, 8-2, at the time.

Kent Studebaker remained undefeated since his return to varsity action a couple of weeks ago as he decided Cal's Mark Heter, 9-2. The Oregon 177-pounder improved his record to 3-0-1, piling up a 7-2 lead at the beginning of the final round and holding on for the victory.

Heavyweight Bob Lawrence closed out Oregon's scoring, pinning Linn Montgomery of California with eight seconds remaining in the match. Lawrence, who had been leading 4-0 when he scored the fall, improved his won-lost mark to 7-6.

They grow 'em tough in Oregon.

Sophomore John Pinkstaff proved it Friday night in McArthur Court as the 6-7 center from South Eugene manhandled Stanford's veteran pivot man, Ray Kosanke, and led the Ducks to an important 57-66 victory over the Indians.

"I thought Pinkstaff played as good a game as he has all season, and against tough competition," said smiling Webfoot coach Steve Belko. "I can't say too much for him."

Pinkstaff was in control for the entire game, holding the 6-9 Kosanke to nine points and 12 rebounds, while scoring a game-high 20 points and plucking off 17 rebounds, 11 of them in the first half when they were needed most.

Quick Seven Points

The Indians started out like they intended to duplicate their 81-64 victory of the previous weekend. After Pinkstaff dumped in a rebound to give the Ducks a 2-0 lead, Stanford ran off a quick seven points on the shooting of Bob Bedell and Art Harris.

The Webfoots came right back, however, and tied it up at 9-9 when quick Nick Jones stole the ball from the Tribe's Bob Young and completed the play with a sensational two-handed stuff.

The Indians quickly responded by leaping out to a lead they held for the entire first half, and which, at two points, was stretched to eight counters.

The Tribe several times threatened to break the game open as the slick Harris poured in 15 points, but couldn't manage the feat as Jones and Pinkstaff kept the Ducks within distance. Fielders by each of this duo and Pinkstaff's brace of charity tosses brought the Oregon squad within one, 30-29, as the halftime buzzer rang.

Barnett Helps

In the second panel, Oregon's first half heroes continued their scoring, but with the welcome help of Jim Barnett.

The usually-efficient Barnett

picked up three quick fouls and was benched with about 12 minutes left in the first half. He more than made up for it in the final 20 minutes, however, as he pumped in his game-total of 18 points, mostly on long jumpers from the corner and outside.

His layia with 6:36 left moved the Duck sharpshooter into third place in all-time Oregon scoring, as Roger Wiley and his 1,161 points fell to Barnett's steady climbing up the scoring list.

The Indians never had a chance in the second half. With Jones and Barnett dropping in points with machine-like regularity, the Ducks forged ahead, 35-30, and although the Tribe knotted the score at 41-all, they never led again.

Three Share Scoring

Jones, Barnett, and the ever-present Pinkstaff took care of all the Oregon scoring in the second panel, with the blond sophomore's three-point play with 6:52 left, proving to be the final deterrent to any comeback hopes the Tribe cagers might have held. That scoring burst shoved the Webfoots ahead, 55-47, and the Indians never threatened thereafter.

The Ducks, with the aid of Barnett's 7-for-8 performance in the second half, shot .406 for the game despite a frigid .308 average in the opening panel. Stanford hit for 24 field goals, two less than the Webfoots, while shooting .429.

The two squads came out dead even in the rebound battle, 39-39, with Kosanke's dozen grabs leading the Indians.

Jones' 16 counters aided the efforts of Barnett and Pinkstaff, while Harris' 24 points led all scorers. Forward Bob Bedell was the only other Indian in double figures.

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
