

'Head Start' Receives \$26,627 for Training

The University has received a \$26,627 grant from the United States Office of Economic Opportunity for support of a Project Head Start regional training program.

Project Head Start is a preschool program aimed at providing experiences and services which will assist disadvantaged children get a better start in life.

The one-year program will primarily involve a regional training director, now being selected, who will be responsible for coordination and promotion of local Project Head Start training programs in Oregon, Washington and Alaska.

He will provide the local communities with technical assistance in organizing training programs for professional, non-professional, and volunteer personnel, and evaluation and consultation for present programs.

The director will also help structure local Head Start programs, including such areas as curriculum and developing lists of resource personnel; periodically visit communities and help arrange area community meetings; and develop such training projects as workshops at the Uni-

versity or on other campuses, and weekly classes.

His duties may involve work with other community action organizations and programs.

Twenty per cent of the regional training director's time will be available to the University, where he will teach an undergraduate or graduate course or act as a consultant in research in child development.

Harold Abel, director of School Psychological Services, is in charge of administering the grant.

our struggle against Communism. Can you destroy ideas with a sword? Did the Romans do it with the Christians?

Installing or supporting dictators in Viet Nam or the Dominican Republic cannot gain the love of the masses of people in quest of freedom. We are making revolution synonymous with Communism, making the masses in Latin America and S. E. Asia look to China and Russia for support of their struggles.

"We deny our own revolutionary heritage. When our editorials and bellicose Congressmen beat tom-toms and war drums, clamoring for escalation, Americans might ask: 'Who are we killing?' 'Can I support this?' 'What price should Oregon boys pay?'"

Six million Jews were incinerated in Germany because the public learned to regard them as loathsome creatures. Before we start singing "Praise the Lord and Pass the Ammunition" and destroying more Vietnamese people (Communist or not), let's ask ourselves if there really is "No Better Choice . . . For Now."
