The proposal is directed to President Flemming. Its sponsor, Jim Beat, noted that there is a budgetary problem. "There's definitely not enough money now," he said. He estimated the cost at \$3,400 per term.

Booklet Planned

Drummonds, chairman of the Public Affairs Committee, reported a booklet is being planned containing statements on the Viet Nam war prepared by campus political groups. No action was taken, but it is expected it would be sold at cost and financed through the ASUO.

The Senate also reduced the number of reports required of itself. Reports will be submitted by Senators each term, rather

than each month, listing the programs and activities in which they are involved.

In a move to increase coordination between administration and student planning committees, the Senate made the three student members of the University Campus Planning Committee members of the Senate Committee.

Stern to Lecture On Thai Peoples

An illustrated lecture on the "Hill Peoples of Western Thailand" will be given at a meeting of the Natural History Society at 8 p.m. today in 150 Science.

Theodore Stern, University professor of anthropology, will speak.

Stern has done considerable research on the people of Southeast Asia, particularly with respect to their linguistics. He was in the area during 1964-65 under a grant from the National Science Foundation. His work was a continuation of research he started in Burma in 1954-55 under a Fulbright award.

Stern will illustrate his talk with colored slides taken during his two-year-long visit to Southeast Asia.

TV Panel Will Discuss Marketing Influences

Architecture Prof To Speak Today

Murray Milne, professor of architecture who has worked on design for Project Apollo and super-sonic transport, will lecture at 4 p.m. today in 106 Lawrence on "The Design Process and its Cosmic Relation to the Magic Number Seven (Plus or Minus Two, of Course)."

Milne is an assistant professor of architecture who joined the faculty this fall. The lecture is part of a series of faculty lectures scheduled for winter term by the School of Architecture and Allied Arts.

Milne, who has a master's degree in engineering psychology, will focus on the intuitive design process, dealing especially with the problems of immediate memory limitations of the human designer.
