The University debate team finished first in the University of Puget Sound Tyro Tournament during the weekend.

The University won the sweepstakes trophy by overcoming 32 competing schools from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, and Montana.

University debate team members received 97½ out of the 150 sweepstakes points awarded at the tournament. Steve McLaughlin and Chuck Hillestad were individually awarded more points than any other team present.

Individual winners from the University in impromptu competition were: women's — Nancy Seiber, first; Patty King, third; men's — Steve McLaughlin, first.

governing body of Campbell Club, told the Emerald Monday evening that "we don't like the ruling, but it doesn't appear that there is much we can do about it."

Barnes said that prior to the Building Committee's approval of the system-wide co-op policy, members of his corporation had been considering forming another men's co-op to be housed in the low-cost complex. He said that the Board's final decision will "strongly influence" any decision SCA might make.

Barnes said that "it puts you in a much different bargaining position when the student contracts individually. We'd be under greater authority from the University if this goes through, and this is definitely a factor."

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pect the federal government to step in.

"We can't afford the duplication and overlapping which results from a proliferation of governments," McCall declared.

"We are trying to avoid a complete explosion like that at Watts," said McCall in answer to a question about anticipated metropolitan crisis. "We have some of the most enlightened civil rights legislation of any state," he continued. "And we are making plans now to end de facto segregation."

McCall was asked about possible changes in the tax base. He mentioned the many plans for property tax relief which have been proposed. "The tax study commission is a continuous body which is working now to develop some alternate revenue-raising plans should any tax-limitation pass," he explained.

"As governor I would veto any right-to-work bill," McCall declared in answer to other questioning.
