

YD's Ask Bombing End, Students on State Board

University Young Democrats played a major role in formulation of the platform of the state's YD clubs in a meeting at the Eugene Hotel last weekend.

According to Bill Muir, former University YD president, "we made up about 25 per cent of the delegates." Muir said the final platform was essentially the Lane County YD program, which the University club helped to draft to a large degree.

There were about 90 delegates at the convention.

Several resolutions were passed on Viet Nam.

The YD's said the U.S. should stop bombing North Viet Nam; more information about the war should be made available; a cease-fire followed by immediate negotiations with all parties concerned, including the Viet Cong; nations not directly involved in the war should work toward peaceful settlement; and the United States should take the initiative in halting the war.

Two resolutions were voted down. One strongly condemned the American presence in Viet Nam as an act of aggression. The other asked that the title of secretary of defense be changed to secretary of war.

In higher education, the YD's came out in favor of putting three

students on the State Board of Higher Education with full voting rights. Muir said Monday he felt support for the idea among state legislators would be good.

Among other resolutions:

- The establishment of diplomatic relations with Red China, and the seating of that government in the United Nations should be realized.

- An enthusiastic endorsement was given to Robert Straub, of Eugene, an announced Democratic candidate for governor.

- Paid lobbyists on all government levels should be required to register and to report annually all sources of income and all expenditures.

- Annual sessions of the Legislature should be held.

- The number of signatures required for initiative, referendum and recall should not be increased.

- The voting age should be lowered to 18 in Oregon.

- Terms of office in the United States House of Representatives should be lengthened to four years.

- Section 14(b) of the Taft Hartley Law allowing for states to set up their own "right to work" laws should be repealed immediately.

- "Anti-strikebreaker" legisla-

tion to prohibit the importing, training or hiring of professional strikebreakers should be passed.

- Oregon should legislate a maximum 40-hour work week with time-and-a-half to be paid for work over 40 hours.

- Oregon's minimum wage standards should be \$1.25 an hour, and this should include food handlers and agricultural workers.

- The one-and-one-half per cent property tax limitation and the retail sales tax should be opposed, but the four-cents-a-pack cigarette tax should not be.

Essay Contest Deadline Soon

University undergraduates have been invited to submit essays on subjects dealing with reading and the art of fine bookmaking for the Peter Pauper Press Essay Contest of the University Library.

Students wishing to participate in the contest must indicate their intent to participate to Browsing Room Librarian Bernice Rise by March 1.

Contest deadline is April 15. Essays must be submitted to Miss Rise or University Librarian Carl W. Hintz by that date. Prizes will be awarded at the Campus Sing during Junior Weekend.

Ten classics of his own choosing will be awarded to the first place contest winner, and five classics will be given to the second place winner.

Suggested topics are "Great Editions of Great Books," "The Nature of a Classic," "The Collecting of a Student's Library," "What the Classics Mean to Me," and "Reading for Leisure Moments." Students may also write on other topics.

The Peter Pauper Press, owned by Mr. and Mrs. Peter Beilenson, features the classics in inexpensive editions. It presented the University Library with a collection of 50 volumes in September, 1950.

The representative collection of both outstanding bookmaking and outstanding literature was added to the Pauline Potter Homer Collection of Beautiful Books in the Browsing Room of the Student Union.
