Recently, the Emerald and the Student Conduct Committee have taken a serious look into conduct in the dormitories. As a result, Henderson Hall has received inaccurate, unfavorable, and undeserved publicity over an informal dormitory meeting held last week. Is Henderson a group of rowdy, revolt-minded residents protesting counselors "on-the-spot campus-ing" and demanding immediate rights? We, the residents of Henderson, insist not.

Contrary to Emerald belief, Henderson is actually an active respectable freshman dormitory. In October, we were winners of the Homecoming sign contest. Also, we were second in freshman dormitory fall terms grades. Further, we placed second in freshman intramurals last term. We have had absolutely no serious disciplinary problems this year. But, in a recent Emerald editorial, it was suggested that we have "more than its (our) share of trouble-makers." The Emerald has given the impression in two of its issues (as of this writing) that we are making a serious attempt to rebel against our counselors. Such is not the case. On the contrary, our dorm is trying to clear up problems in communication between counselors and residents relative to interpretation of disciplinary policy. Let it be made very clear that we are not revolting against authority (our counselors), nor are we trying to cause trouble.

Through apparently inaccurate news coverage, the Emerald has created a false impression of Henderson Hall's residents.

It is high time that the President and the Congress moved to eliminate war profiteering here at home and not just in Saigon. The sacrifices in blood by our young men in Viet Nam must, at the very least, be matched by sacrifices in treasure by Americans, young and old, at home.

Whether you believe as I do, that this is an illegal, unconstitutional and immoral war, you should agree with me that profits at home in the United States should not be tied to a larger and longer war in Asia. No one should have a selfish stake in extending the conflict in time or space.

"Peace scares" cause momentary sags in the stock market. This is wrong. Appropriate legislative steps should be taken immediately to establish bodies like the World War II Renegotiation Board to tax away all war profits.

If our sons can be sent to battle to be wounded or to die, the folks at home can forego enriching themselves. Besides, the Great Society domestic program for education, conservation, pollution control and the war against poverty needs these funds.

To keep faith with our servicemen the President should take immediate steps, by executive order and through the Congress, to eliminate the profits from this and every war.

Certainly there are failures. The few sullen and self-pitying faces in the crowd show that not all are being reached. But any system is measured by its success, and few experiments have brought such satisfying results as the Job Corps Center.

It is important to realize that Tongue Point definitely does have something to offer the University.

## Closer Contact

From the impetus to examine and revitalize our own programs, to the opportunity for

exercising creativity in an area of programming that is wide open, the Directorate has been made to see many areas in which closer contact would profit both institutions.

Art and talent exchanges, athletic competitions, joint use of facilities such as Tongue Point's extensive boating, camping and hiking facilities, dialogues and conferences are some of the many areas in which contact between the University students and Corpsmen can help build this relationship. Such activities also give students a chance to participate in some way in this dynamic educational experiment.

All of us were surprised at how little the Corpsmen know of the University. "How could they," we asked, "be so ignorant of an institution that is part of their organization?"

But, by the same token, we might do well to question ourselves similarly. Why should we know so little? Why must it remain so? Why should preconceptions dominate our thoughts?
