

Composer Comes To Hear Concert

A nationally known composer, George Rochberg, will be in Eugene to attend the University Symphonic Band Concert at 8 p.m. today in the Sheldon High School auditorium. Conductor will be Robert Wagner, professor of music and director of bands.

Rochberg is coming to hear the second performance of his new wind-band composition, "Apocalyptica," an unusual work which uses 12 percussion players and 28 percussion instruments.

Completed "Apocalyptica" has been said to parallel the emotional content of one of Shakespeare's King Lear speeches, which prefaces the score.

Rochberg is head of the music department at the University of Pennsylvania in Philadelphia.

Another new major work to be performed is Aaron Copland's "Emblems," a work written especially for college bands which also extensively utilizes percussion instruments.

The Symphonic Band will also perform Robert Russell Burnett's "Symphonic Songs for Band," two 20th century Russian works—Shostakovich's "Festive Overture, Op. 96" and Knachaturian's "Dances," three movements from the "Serenade No. 10 for Wind Instruments, K. 361" by Mozart, and a brass fanfare from Debussy's "Le Martyre de St. Sebastian," and Grant Fletcher's "Heralds for Brass Instruments."

Today's concert is the first formal appearance of the 65-member University Symphonic Band this season. Each year the band presents a number of new compositions from the United States and Europe.

The public is invited to attend free of charge.

Disinterest Kills Viet Nam Forum

A forum on Viet Nam planned for Friday has been cancelled due to lack of participants.

Joseph Jorgenson, assistant professor of anthropology and co-chairman of the Faculty-Student Committee to Stop the War in Viet Nam, told the Emerald Wednesday that he asked Herbert Lundy, editorial page editor of the Portland Oregonian; 4th District Rep. Robert B. Duncan; and former Congressman Charles O. Porter to participate.

They were to discuss a Senate resolution introduced by Sen. Ernest Greuning (D-Alaska), which would not allow draftees to be sent to Viet Nam against their will.

Porter, a critic of the Johnson Administration's policies in Viet Nam, accepted Jorgenson's invitation.

Lundy turned down the bid, however. Jorgenson said Lundy told him his paper's editorial positions were clear and that the Oregonian provides an adequate forum for discussion in "The People's Corner," the letters-to-the-editor section.

Jorgenson said two telegrams were sent to Duncan asking him to participate in the forum, furnish the name of an Administration supporter who would appear, or send a statement on the Greuning bill.

Jorgenson said Duncan did not reply to either telegram.

Jorgenson added that such a conference might be held in the future if he could find an Administration supporter.

Church Council Favors Seating Of Red China

ST. LOUIS, Mo. (AP) — The general board of the National Council of Churches went on record Wednesday as favoring the admission of Red China to the United Nations.

The vote was 90 yes, three no, and one abstention.

The resolution was introduced by University President Arthur S. Flemming.

The statement also proposes that a study be made of possible diplomatic recognition of the Chinese government.

The declaration urged the United States to pursue a policy of support for the seating of Red China in the United Nations "under conditions which take into account the welfare and political status of Formosa (the seat of the National Chinese government)."

Co-operation on the exchange of information on food production, birth control, and other types of technological development was also urged.

The board said its recommendations on China were made "as Christians, and therefore as witnesses to a Lord who reconciles us all" while recognizing "the increasing belligerence of mainland China."

The board also approved a statement supporting the right and responsibility of an individual to dissent.
