

Director Explains Appalachia Project

Gibbs Kinderman, project director for the Appalachian Volunteers, met with interested students Thursday afternoon. He outlined the history and objectives of the program and discussed volunteers' experiences last summer.

The Appalachian Volunteers was privately founded in 1964 by East Kentucky College students interested in working with the people of their state's isolated mountain regions.

The 1965 summer project involved 150 volunteers working in 43 isolated communities. They lived with families in each community, working in one-room schools and helping with community projects.

This summer, the project will be expanded to 500 volunteers working in over 100 communities. The program, formerly restricted to east Kentucky, will be expanded to include the Appalachian regions of Tennessee, Virginia, and West Virginia.

Volunteers will participate in a ten-day training and orientation program before working in the field. Afterwards, three to ten

volunteers will be sent to each project, depending on the size of the community.

The Appalachian Volunteer Summer Project will be largely financed by the Office of Economic Opportunity—the Community Action and the VISTA divisions.

While the program is not actually associated with VISTA, VISTA will help to finance three of four summer volunteer projects this year through the VISTA Associates program.

Kinderman noted that any interested students could apply to the Appalachian Volunteer Summer Project, C.P.O. 2307, Berea, Kentucky. He added that applications should be filed by March 15.

Art Prof to Give Faculty Lecture

"Food for Understanding" will be the topic of David Stannard, assistant professor of art, at 4 p.m. today in 106 Lawrence in the School of Architecture and Allied Arts faculty lecture series.

Stannard, who teaches ceramics, believes that art, man's transformation of things around him, is important in man's education. He calls it necessary "food" for nourishment of the inner self.

Although Stannard was born in California, he spent most of his youth in China. He received a degree in chemistry from the University of Redlands, then worked as a potter with Tackett Associates at the Leach Pottery in Cornwall, England, and in a Mexican village of potters.

Stannard joined the University faculty last fall.

Prior to being a visiting lecturer at the University of Minnesota last year, he operated Hill Top Stoneware Pottery in Eugene.
