SEATTLE (Special)—The Oregon Ducks dropped a 61-60 game to the Washington Huskies here Saturday night in anything but a thriller.

Even though the game was closely contested throughout, it was an extremely dull game with many, many fouls being whistled.

Twenty-four personal fouls were charged to the Ducks, and many of these were of the charging variety, a type of foul which has come to be one of the hottest disputed rules in basketball.

After the game Oregon coach Steve Belko, hesitantly, said, "The most abused thing in our refereeing this year is the offensive foul."

Belko went on to clarify his statement with, "There are two

different rules in the book, one is for when you have the ball and the other when you don't, but I guess that means nothing in our conference."

Belko was particularly incensed with two calls by the officials that gave the Huskies possession when charging was called against Jim Barnett and one time against John Pinkstaff.

Late in the game Barnett was called for charging into a Husky. (He was "caught" when he had a step on his defender.)

Pinkstaff was charged by a Husky late in the game under the Washington basket. After having his hands in the air and his position the officials "got" him for charging the offensive man. It was Pinkstaff's fifth personal.

The first half was a seesaw affair for the first 10 minutes until the Ducks hit a cold spell after tying the score at 14-14 with 10:57 gone.

At this point the Ducks found themselves seven points back before they scored again on a free throw with 6:54 showing in the first period of play.

Jones Scores Two

However, the Ducks quickly got a basket from Nick Jones on a drive, and a singleton on Barnett's conversion of a technical called on the Huskies' Gordy Harris. They then trailed by

three, 21-18.

After Harris got a fallaway jumper from seven feet, Jones hit for the Ducks on a one-hander from 10 feet on the left baseline. Carr got one for a five-point lead at 25-20 with 4:05 showing and then the Ducks hit off three on a jumper by Bob Craven and a free shot by Barnett, making it 25-23 for Washington.

After the Huskies scored two more on a jumper by Levi Fischer, the Ducks went ahead with 1:28 remaining on a 15 footer by Craven, two free throws by Barnett and another pair by Pinkstaff.

With a second showing on the clock Carr tied the score at 28-28 with one of two gift tosses from the line.

Second Half Like First

The second half was much like the first. Neither team was able to pull away with the Huskies' biggest margin being six and the Ducks' two.

The Huskies moved ahead once by five with 7:01 remaining, but the Ducks came scrapping back with fielders by Barnett and Craven and a free throw from Barnett, to knot the game at 51-51 with 5:55 to go.

The Huskies rallied again and with 2:12 to go had another five-point lead at 60-55. Again the Ducks ran back with a Barnett charity toss and a Jones fielder before the Huskies got their last point, the fatal one, with :42 seconds remaining on a free-throw by Steve Olsen. The Ducks got a

25-footer by Kafoury with :30 left but couldn't get the ball back again.

The statistics were very odd in many respects. Even though the Huskies got 23 fielders to the Ducks' 25, they had the extra chances at the line. But they hit only 15 of 32 at the charity stripe. In addition, the Huskies had 17 ball control errors, which in most cases would be enough for the other team to win the game.

Ducks Shoot .391

The Ducks, who were out rebounded by a margin of 50-41, had 25 of 64 from the field for .391 average. The Huskies hit at a .434 clip. The Ducks got 10 of 15 free throws but didn't have the opportunities to win at the line like the Huskies did. The Ducks were guilty of only eight turnovers.

Barnett, Pinkstaff Foul Out

Even though both Barnett and Pinkstaff fouled out, their presence was not missed noticeably because of the lateness of the game when they left. Barnett went out with 1:47 to go on an offensive foul. He had 18 for the game which was high for both sides. Pinkstaff fouled out with eight points, and the clock showing :04 to go.

Rounding out the Duck scoring was Bob Craven with 14, 10 of those coming in the second half when he put on a fine show of shooting ability, and 10 by Nick Jones.

Bill Thomas, whose best play is on the boards (he had seven caroms), had eight points along with Pinkstaff and Kafoury had two to round out the Oregon attack.

For the Huskies, Dave Carr had 16 for high honors, followed by Gordy Harris with 15, and Steve Olsen with 12. Olsen's play

in the second half was a vital part to the Washington win as he hit consistently from the outside to ruin the Duck zoning tactics.

Both Dave Hovde and Doug Westlake had seven, with Levi Fischer netting three and Bob Johnson one to make 61 points for the winners.

The loss all but eliminated the Ducks from any title hopes as their league record is now, 6-5. They are 13-10 on the year.

The University of Washington gymnastic team added to their trophy case as it won its seventh Northwest Gymnastic Championship in eight years Saturday night in McArthur Court. The Huskies took first place in six of the eight events as they amassed 180 points for first place.

The remaining top place was nabbed by Oregon's Ducks as they won second-place honors over Washington State, 155-153.

The Washington frosh were fourth with 148 points, and Eastern Washington had 141 points for fifth place. The Oregon frosh finished last in the nine-team meet with 73 points.

Mike Flansaas, whose wife was top gymnast for the 1964 Olympic team, barely edged two of his teammates for the all-around title. Flansaas finished first in the parallel bars, and second in the side horse for 52 points.

Lovell Wins Two

His teammate, Mike Lovell, won both the horizontal bar and floor exercise competitions, but was one point behind Flansaas for second place. A third teammate,

Eigil Flaathen, had 49 points for third place.

Oregon won the trampoline and long horse events. Team captain John Turchi placed first and Tom Heinbegner third to pace the Ducks on the trampoline. Art English added his points to give the Ducks first place in the event.

John Palmer, coach Dick Smith's only three-year letterman, combined his efforts with those of Don Cooper and Jim Huston to give the Ducks first place on the long horse.

Besides the two first places, the Duck team took third place in the side horse, floor exercise, and horizontal bar. A fourth place finish on the parallel bars, and an eighth place on the still rings completed the Duck scoring.

Third Place Finishes

Leading the Ducks in their third place finishes were Turchi, floor exercise; Mike Olsen, side horse; and Allen Amsbury on the horizontal bar.

Jim Civey was high point man for the Ducks on the parallel bars, and Cooper topped the Duck competitors on the still rings.

This was the highest finish for



the Ducks in their third year of competition, and their first defeat of Washington State.

Ruggers, Kickers 'Halt' Opponents

The Oregon rugby and soccer clubs each recorded a victory Saturday, but that was about all they had in common.

The soccer team didn't even play a game to score its win.

The opposition was to be the University of Portland, but they never showed up. Coach Jan Broekhoff, disgusted with the Pilots, said that their excuse for not traveling to Eugene was that "they couldn't find their uniforms."

When Broekhoff offered to lend them some of Oregon's equipment, the Portland club replied that they couldn't find their coach, either. "I'm afraid they were a little bit scared," Broekhoff concluded. The forfeit gives Oregon an 8-0 season slate.

The University of Victoria rugby team did show up, however, and they jumped off to a quick 3-0 lead on a penalty kick by Dave Clark. The rest of the

contest was all Oregon, though, as the Ducks won, 12-3.

After knotting the score at 3-3 on a penalty kick by Ian Stevenson, the Ducks broke loose in the second half to wrap up the victory. Stevenson booted a 25-yard field goal, and wing Warren Hamill and forward Ron Larsen each scored tries. Hamill covered 25 yards, while Larsen ran 15 yards for the scores.

Oregon coach Bruce Howe thought his best performers were forwards Larsen and Bruce Morrison and back Don Simonson. "Ian Stevenson also played well for his first game," the coach added.

The second rugby team defeated Salem, 19-0. Back John Taylor scored two tries and "all the seconds really looked good," according to Howe.

The rugby squad next week will face a very determined Oregon State team which the Ducks defeated last Saturday. The soccer team will battle Lewis and Clark.

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
