

Committee to Make Plans For Law School Expansion

Plans for the expansion of the Law School physical facilities and of its programs in law teaching, research, and services are being developed by a Law School Planning Committee, according to Dean Orlando John Hollis.

Allan Hart, Portland attorney and former member of the Oregon State Board of Higher Education, is serving as director of the committee's study.

Chairman of the committee is Hans Linde, professor of law. Committee members include Hollis, Frank Lacy, professor of law, and Robert Summers, associate professor of law.

Enrollment at the Law School this year has reached the maximum capacity of present facilities, according to the committee, and projections show that these facilities will not be able to house the Law School's faculty and projected student enrollment even during the next two years.

University President Arthur S. Flemming has told Law School

alumni that the objective of the plan is the establishment of "one of the outstanding legal centers in our nation."

President Flemming has indicated that the expanded facilities now being planned are urgently needed, and will be presented to the State Board of Higher Education this year for inclusion in the budget of the next biennium.

In addition to providing the best quality of legal instruction, other objectives are to carry forward legal research and to provide programs that will be of service to the judiciary, the legal profession, and public agencies.

In planning for future legal

education at the University, members of the committee draw upon personal experience of study and teaching at the law schools of Harvard, Yale, California, Stanford, Iowa, Oxford, and New York University.

The committee will also consult visiting experts and examine plans of law schools and legal centers that have been established in many other states during recent years.

Exhibition Shows Job Corps Art

Art work by Tongue Point Job Corpsmen is being exhibited in the Taylor Lounge on the first floor of the Student Union through March 7.

The 25 works on display represent the first personal experience with artistic expression for most of the Job Corpsmen. Watercolor and oil paintings, and pencil, pen and ink, and crayon drawings are included.

Most of the artists whose works are represented in the exhibit are enrolled in regular vocational programs.

Dale Owen, chairman of the Center's arts and crafts department, says, "I'm trying to make these chaps understand that there is more to life than getting a job, that each of them has creativity within him that careful nurturing and instruction can bring out."

The Tongue Point Center is the only Job Corps center where art and music are a regular part of the course offering.

More art work by Tongue Point Job Corpsmen will be shown at the University in the future.

Juilliard Quartet to Give Concert

The music ensemble acknowledged as the "first family of chamber music" in the United States, the Juilliard Quartet, will be presented in concert at 8 p.m. Tuesday in the School of Music auditorium.

The quartet gained this distinction in 1962 by appointment as Quartet-in-Residence of the Library of Congress in Washington, D.C.

The Juilliard Quartet concert is one of the Little Concert Series sponsored by the Student Union Board and is also a feature of the University's 1966 Festival of Arts.

Admission is by season ticket or at the door. Single admission is \$2.50 for adults and \$2 for students.

The quartet's first violinist is Robert Mann, a native of Portland, where he received his ini-

tial musical training. The other members of the ensemble are Raphael Hillyer, violist; Claus Adam, cellist, and Earl Carlyss, violinist.

The ensemble is Quartet-in-Residence of the Juilliard School of Music in New York, where they conduct classes in ensemble playing, participate in discussions and student workshops, give individual instruction, and present concerts. Between these assignments and their commitments at the Library of Congress, they tour the world.

Portland Man Opposes Hatfield's Senate Bid

PORTLAND (AP) — Walter Huss, 47, Portland, a long-time public opponent of the left, announced he will run against Gov. Mark Hatfield for the Republican nomination for the U.S. Senate.

In making the announcement, Huss identified Hatfield's beliefs "with those of the minority, extreme left wing," and added that Oregon "cannot accept their governor's willingness to insult the sacrifices of our freedom fighters."
