

Co-op to Open Second Floor Addition

The second floor of the University Co-op's \$500,000 addition will open today, a step which the Co-op's board of directors has looked forward to for over ten years.

Furnishing of the new building will not be complete until early in spring term, but all of the books presently sold on the first floor of the Co-op Bookstore have been moved to the new second floor.

Art supplies will be sold on the first floor of the older bookstore (which was completed in 1961), and Co-op offices will take up the rest of the space.

To Leave Chapman

When the first floor of the new building is finished, the Co-op will move completely out of its

present Chapman Hall quarters. The Co-op is not in any way controlled by the University, and, in the near future, will not even use University property. It is a private co-operative association owned exclusively by University students.

Although the present Co-op was not started until 1920, there was a University Bookstore in existence between 1911 and 1916.

It was owned by the University, but was dissolved to help pay off debts of other campus organizations.

Faculty Corporation

When the Co-op was incorporated in June of 1920, the store's first manager, M. F. McClain, was able to obtain credit from several book publishers; however, this was not enough to start a store, so several faculty members formed a separate corporation, the University Supply Co.

This group sold \$100 shares and, by that means, was able to get enough working capital to begin operations. The University Supply Co. was dissolved in 1933. Since then, the Co-op has been a financially independent business.

From 1924 until the Depression started, the Co-op paid a small dividend to its members, each of whom had paid a \$1 membership fee.

Trade Tokens Taken

In 1927 and 1928, aluminum trade tokens were substituted for the cash rebates, but administrative difficulties were too great to continue the use of tokens.

California Man To Speak at UO

A California architect, William Turnbull, Jr., will lecture at the University today. The public is invited to hear him discuss "Land Form—Building Form" at 8 p.m. in 123 Science.

Turnbull, a consulting professor at the University's School of Architecture and Allied Arts this term, attended St. Marks College and received his Master of Fine Arts degree from Princeton University.

From 1950 to 1963, he was with the San Francisco architecture firm of Skidmore, Owings and Merrill. During that time, he participated in the Monterey South Coast Master Plan, an attempt to preserve 80 miles of the rugged California coastline. He also worked on an urban renewal project in Sacramento, California, and designed the Quantas Motel in Sydney, Australia.

In 1963, Turnbull was a member of the design group of the advisory council appointed by President Kennedy to redesign Pennsylvania Avenue in the nation's capital.

Turnbull is a founding partner of the architecture firm of Moore, Lyndon, Turnbull, Whitaker, and now heads their Berkeley office.

Effects of the depression, however, caused the Co-op to lose money. It operated at a loss, or with little profit, until 1937, when the financial situation improved. The year 1939 saw the Co-op again paying its members a five per cent rebate for their purchases.

The Co-op moved to the ground floor of Chapman Hall in 1939 from its frame building on the corner of 13th and Kincaid.

During the years immediately following World War II, the University's enrollment increased drastically because of the GI's going back to college, and the Co-op began to feel crowded in its Chapman Hall store.

30 Per Cent Rebate

In 1947, several weeks before the deadline for handing in cash receipts for rebates, the Co-op's board of directors announced that the store would give a 30 per cent rebate on all purchases.

Since this premature announce-

ment gave students time to make large purchases, with the assurance of a 30 per cent rebate, the store went into debt when it had to pay its members' rebates.

It took the Co-op two years to get out of debt.

Gerald Henson took over as manager of the Co-op in 1948, and

'Temple Mound' Lecture Topic

E. Mott Davis, associate professor of anthropology at the University of Texas, will review the rise and decline of the Temple Mound culture at 8 p.m. today in 106 Lawrence Hall.

Davis will discuss Mississippian culture in the Eastern United States and explain a research problem in northeastern Texas, where a local variant of the Temple Mound culture has been found in its waning stages.

He will use about 50 colored slides to illustrate his talk.

He will also explain the role of radiocarbon dating in archaeology.

The talk is sponsored by the Eugene Society of the Archaeological Institute of America.

still holds that position. That was also the start of the Co-op's consistent 10 per cent dividends, and the membership fee was lowered from \$1 to 25 cents.

Property Purchased

Future expansion plans were formulated by the board of directors and, in 1955, property on the corner of 13th and Kincaid was purchased for \$65,000. It was rented for the following ten years, paying for itself.

Today, the property is probably worth \$150,000, according to a representative of a company which loans money to colleges for construction purposes.

Part of the property was used for the construction in 1961 of the Co-op's bookstore.

A board consisting of two faculty members and five students governs the Co-op; the University Co-op is among the three per cent of the college bookstores in the country which are co-operatives.
