

Sentence Upheld by Court; Four Raiders Sanctioned

The University steam tunnels are potential death traps, warned Physical Plant Superintendent Leland Lorange, in a Student Court session Friday.

Facts about these steam tunnels that are seemingly unknown to many students were brought out during an appeal by two freshmen who had been sanctioned in minor court for being in the steam tunnels.

The power lines running through these tunnels carry 4,200 volts. Lorange pointed out how easily a student could electrocute himself in attempting to jump across the wires. Death would be instantaneous.

Violation of Code

Not only are these underground tunnels dangerous, but it is a violation of Section I.B. 2.e. of the Student Conduct Code, and of Eugene trespassing laws for unauthorized persons to be in the tunnels.

As a trespasser, any student caught in the tunnels will be re-

ferred to the Eugene Police Department.

Damage done in these tunnels by students costs the physical plant about \$100 a month, Lorange said. Damage is most commonly broken light bulbs, stolen locks, broken doors, and cut chains. There are also beer cans which have to be picked up.

Disciplinary Probation

Lorange added that high school, as well as University, students have been in the tunnels.

The students who were appealing their sanction of disciplinary probation from Feb. 10 to May 1, felt the duration of probation was too long in view of their violations.

The two maintained their violation was less serious than other violations which had brought lighter sanctions.

After hearing Lorange's testimony, the Court decided the sanction imposed by minor court was not too severe and should be upheld.

In the other hearing of the session the Court found four

freshman men guilty of violating Section I.B. 3.c. of the Code.

The four pleaded guilty to the charge that they entered the sleeping quarters of Caswell Hall, a women's dorm. They were given disciplinary probation for the remainder of winter term and all of spring term.

Another charge had been filed against the four—that they were in possession of 10 pairs of panties and one pair of pajamas, which had been reported as stolen. This was a violation of Section I.B. 2.e. pertaining to the misuse of private property on campus. This charge was dismissed from lack of sufficient evidence that the property had been misused.

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African Landscape Lecture Topic

William J. Talbot, chairman of the Department of Geography at the University of Cape Town, South Africa, will discuss "South Africa Landscape" at a meeting of the Natural History Society Friday, at the University.

Talbot, a visiting professor of geography at the University this year will show colored slides during his lecture at 8 p.m. in 150 Science. The program is open to the public.

The author of numerous publications on South Africa geography, Talbot was one of the three

official South African representatives to the International Geographical Congress and International Cartographic Assembly.

Talbot is a Fellow of the Royal Society of South Africa, a distinction held by only 100 individuals from all branches of science. He has been a member of the Association of American Geographers since 1957.

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
