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keeping records. "It's things like this that make students distrust the Office of Student Affairs," Carl said. "For example, letters have been sent home by people in that office when a girl dates a Negro."

Flemming said he was unaware that such letters were sent. The closing hours plan Flemming outlined will work this way:

New Plan

Three adjacent dormitory units housing about 180 women will be available for women who don't want to have closing hours.

Senior women and women 21 and over are automatically exempt from closing hours if they want to be. About 40 such women are living in Bean West, this year without closing hours. Women's co-ops now have varying provisions for such women to come in after closing hours. Sorority women have agreed to abide by closing hours.

Someone will be on duty in these units to let girls in during the normal closing hours.

Girls must apply for the right to live in these dormitories. Applications from juniors and sophomores not over 21 will have to be endorsed by their parents. Applications must be in before the end of the academic year, probably by May 1 or May 15.

Applications Screened

Applications from sophomores and juniors will be screened by a committee consisting of the assistant director of dormitories, the president of Bean West, and a woman member of the Student Conduct Committee.

They will have the right to reject an application if they feel a girl is unfit to live in such a unit, but Flemming made clear that "the burden of proof is on the committee" to show why a girl should be rejected, not on the girl to show why she should be admitted. Girls may appeal a

screening board decision to the Conduct Committee.

He said the limitation to 180 women in the dormitories was made necessary by a lack of space.

Flemming also indicated that it would be possible, if 160 girls were accepted for the 180 places to re-open applications later to fill out the units.

Few Probable

Rick Siefke, student member of the Conduct Committee, said, "If we're going to have a good experiment we should let everybody in. Flemming replied that he expected few girls would be screened out."

ASUO President Steve Goldschmidt said he thought there should be some guidelines for the screening board. "I don't like the idea of judging morality," he said.

Flemming said he preferred to have the board develop its own guidelines. "After a year we'll be able to judge better what they should be," Flemming said. "It's hard to say what standards should be set." Pam Bladine, a probable member of the new board, agreed.

The Committee will also discuss early next term a policy for women not living in dormitories. They had a petition from girls living in co-ops asking to implement the program this spring. Flemming had no objection but suggested it might be unfair to give those girls the jump.

Sororities Won't Change

Paula Biggs, president of Panhellenic said Tuesday the sororities will continue to abide by an agreement which says they will have closing hours.

The meeting also clarified a case in which Flemming's office was checking on a student nominated for a committee by ASUO President Steve Goldschmidt. Flemming asked for information on the student from the Office of Student Affairs and received, among other things, a detailed police record for the student for three years.

Flemming had set a policy earlier which prohibited the keeping of records of student police arrests. Dean Nickerson said then, and repeated Saturday, that someone had "remembered" the person in question. He refused to answer a direct question from Goldschmidt on whether a record had been kept.

But Flemming explained that the old files which contained police records hadn't been cleared out when his request for infor-

mation went to the Office of Student Affairs.

"I'm confident it's been

straightened out now," Flemming

said. Nickerson explained that
